Farmers Will Use Sodato. Oregon farmers will use this winter, it is stated, nearly 500,000 pounds of sodato, surplus war explosive made available by the government.

This estimate is made by Geo. W. Kable, agricultural engineer for the extension service, O. A. C., who is in charge of the distribution of sodato for the state. This will be used mostly in clearing land. Orders for 20,000 pounds have been placed with S. B. Hall for use in Multnomah county.
