Interstate Bridge Shows Large Net Earnings. Gross earnings from the interstate bridge during 1923 reached \$357,913; expenses were \$41,875, leaving a net profit of \$316,038, according to report made to the commission by Alexander C. Rae, auditor.

Net earnings for 1923 were 28.83 per cent, better than in 1922. Of the net earnings, three-fifths, or \$189,622, goes to Multnomah county and two-fifths, or \$126,415, to Clarke county, Washington.

Since the bridge was opened on February 15, 1917, total earnings have been \$2,050,528; the expenses were \$265,427, leaving a net revenue of \$1,785,101. Multnomah county's share has been \$1,057,263 and Clarke county's share \$709,439. Betterments and repairs have cost \$22,828.

During 1923 there were 2,798,397 persons, not including those in street cars, who crossed the bridge. Automobiles, including motorcycles, totaled 1,022,383, and trucks, including trailers, reached 158,460. Horse drawn vehicles sank into insignificance with a total of 4357.
