The Worker's Council meeting follows the preaching service. All officers of the church and Sunday school should be present to make this meeting a success.

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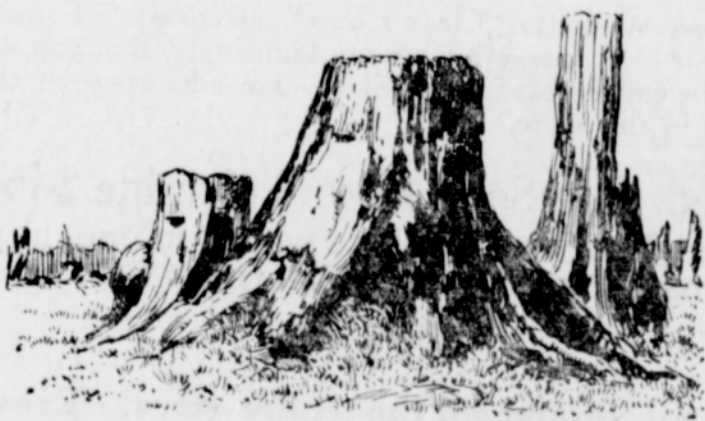
