In the name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause on or before the 23d day of January, 1924, and if you fail to so appear or answer, for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in the complaint, to-wit:

SODATOL FOR BLASTING TO BE DEMONSTRATED

A demonstration of sodatol for stump blasting will be given under the direction of County Agent S. B. Hall at the H. F. Whilon farm about a mile north and east of Pleasant Home on what is known as the Cannon road on Friday afternoon, January 18, at 1:30 o'clock.

Several farmers from this part of the county secured sodatol from the first carload which was brought into the county. The caps have arrived and Mr. Hall will be prepared to supply those who have not received them. A number of people have indicated their intention of ordering more of the powder and about half a carload has already been spoken for. Mr. Hall is attempting at this time to get the orders of all who intend to use the sodatol and it may be that another carload will be required.
