### ROUTE CARRIER SOON TO BE APPOINTED

Miss Elizabeth E. Johnson of the Gresham postoffice is in receipt of a letter from the postoffice department announcing the result of the examination which was held last November to establish a register from which appointments will be made to fill vacancies as they may occur on rural routes from the Gresham office.

Of the eight young men who took the examination the three passing highest are, Oscar E. Noreen, first; Ernest W. Stratton, second; Etienne J. Charbonneau, third.

Mr. Noreen is given military preference due to the fact of his service in the World War.

As a result of the efforts of the American Legion and others interested in equalization measures favorable to veterans of the World War, legislation has been enacted giving veterans the preference over non-veterans in filling civil service positions.

At the present time there is a vacancy on Route 4, or Route 1, as it is officially known, due to the transfer of W. L. Gorsage, former rural carrier, to the position of clerk in the postoffice. Miss Johnson has been asked to make a report concerning the qualifications of the three eligibles above mentioned, and it is expected that an appointment will be made in the near future.

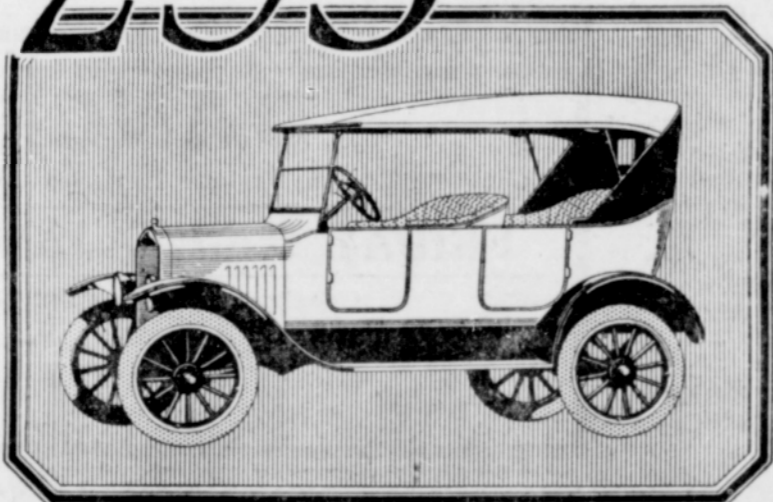

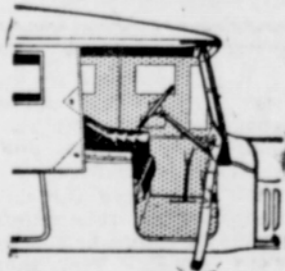
