ROGER W. BABSON'S OPINION.

Roger W. Babson, head of the great Babson Statistical institute, under date of July 19, 1923, said:

"The great improvement in business which followed the war, and is so clearly shown by the Babson-chart, was very largely the result of the influence of prohibition and the salvage of our former waste of two billion dollars or more each year due to the liquor traffic. I know of no other way to account for the great impetus in home building, the tremendous numbers of new automobiles purchased, the larger volume of department store sales, accompanied at the same time by a continued swelling of savings bank deposits, when the tendency of business as a whole should normally have been downward."

OIL MIDDLE ENGAGES SENATE.

The senate has adopted the Walsh oil lease annulment resolution which declares the leases signed by Secretary of the Navy Denby to have been made without authority and contrary to law.

The senate now has before it a resolution, known as the Robinson resolution, which calls upon the president to demand the immediate resignation of Secretary Denby.

SCHOOL TROUBLES AILED.

The trouble over the principal of the Estacada schools is to have a hearing in court. Charges have been preferred against Carl Einerson, principal, brought by one or two of the directors, charging that he has ridiculed the Bible and those believing in it, allowed school property to become untidy, caused certain school activities to cease and general unprofessional conduct.

Judge Campbell has issued an order against A. G. Ames and A. DeMay, directors, to show why they should not be restrained from their proposed action against the school principal.

Tips for Taxpayers.

No. 6. In computing his net income for the year 1923 a taxpayer may deduct from gross income all losses, incurred not only in his business, trade or profession, but in any "transaction entered into for profit" not compensated for by insurance or otherwise.

To be allowed, losses not incurred in trade or business must conform closely to the wording of the statute. For example, a loss incurred in the sale of a taxpayer's home, which at the time of purchase was bought without intention of resale, is not deductible because it was not a transaction entered into for profit.

Losses sustained in the operation of a farm as a business venture are deductible. If sustained in the operation of a farm operated merely for the pleasure or convenience of the taxpayer, such losses are not deductible.

The Ten Fundamentals.

Humanity lives and has always lived on some elementary or fundamental provisions. The more simply

you live the more you safeguard your future.

The following simple rules are suggested to assist the individual to adjust himself to his surroundings. Personal hygiene consists of the physical adjustment of an individual to his surroundings.

The Fundamentals.

Have fresh air where you live and work.

Breathe deeply, slowly, and regularly.

Eat slowly, regularly, and moderately simple natural foods.

Keep clean, internally and externally.

Do not allow poisons and infections to enter your body.

Exercise an intelligent control over your nervous system.

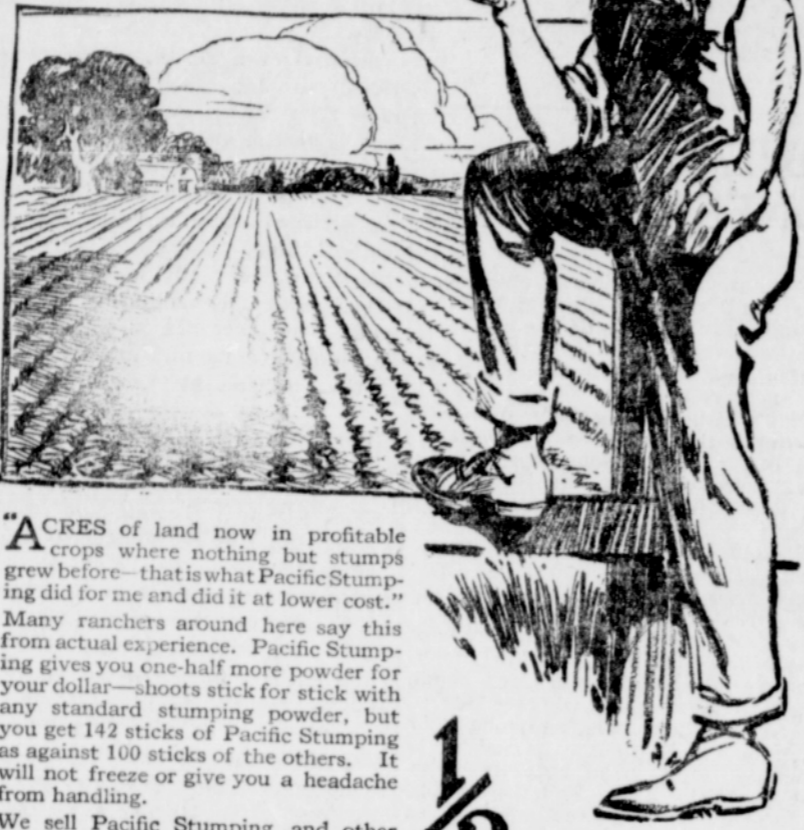
Work efficiently and diligently eight hours.

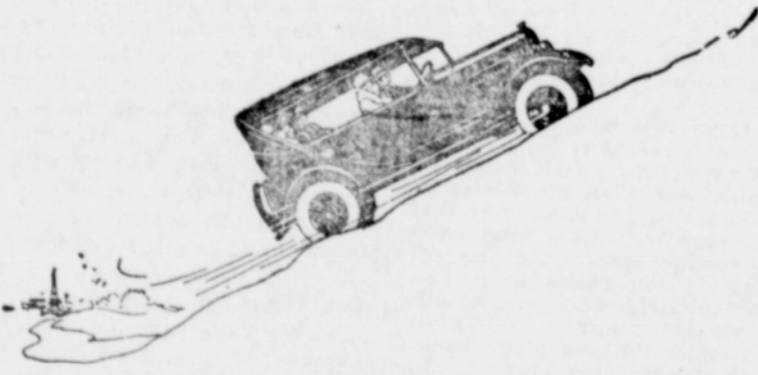
