NEWSPAPERS AND THE MAIL.

The Outlook wishes to express its appreciation to the postoffice department and its satisfaction over the recent order of Postmaster General New placing newspapers on practically the same basis in the matter of transmission and delivery as first-class mail matter.

This is the first definite and comprehensive program adopted by the department in handling newspapers and is a recognition of their growing importance in the eyes of the public.

The essence of the order is that newspapers shall not be mixed with parcels post at any point in their dispatch from the publishers' office until their delivery to the addressees.

Another feature of the order is the elimination of sacks of mail which are known to the business world as "mixed mail."

Another important feature is that postmasters are required to notify publishers in each instance when they do not hit the dispatch which they advertise to hit; also to notify publishers when they are sending to wrong addresses and to the addresses of deceased persons.

Under the new system, newspapers will be made up in separate sacks plainly labeled. If there are only a few copies of newspapers at the point of dispatch, they will be placed in separate sacks, even though the sacks are only partially filled.

This order means much to the American public. It is one of the most important and far-reaching steps in postoffice history. It is for the benefit of those who desire to have their newspapers placed before them at as early a moment as possible.

The order is the result of painstaking effort on the part of the postoffice inspectors, under the direction of First Assistant Postmaster General Bartlett. Carefully worded and minute instructions have been issued all employees engaged in handling the mails, so that there will be no possibility of misunderstanding the importance of getting newspapers to the reader with a minimum of delay.

NEW TYPE OF FORD TRUCK BEING MADE

The Ford Motor company has entered the new year with a new product, an all-steel combination truck body and cab mounted on the standard Ford one-ton chassis to be sold as a complete unit, according to Raker & Son, local dealers.

The new body is of the open express type, so constructed that it may be readily converted into other body combinations by using stakes, side boards, canopy top, screen sides, etc.

"In fact," says the Ford statement, "the purpose in producing the new body was to place a low cost general utility truck, meeting both agricultural and commercial requirements at the disposal of ton truck users."

The body is built of steel to withstand the most severe usage and presents a new development in construction. The steel sills are reinforced with wood in order to lessen vibration and road shocks, thus making for more durability and longer life.

The loading space is seven feet two inches in length by four feet in width and of convenient and practical depth. The end gate is strongly braced and secured by heavy chains which hold it in position when lowered.

The cab, also of steel construction is extra roomy. The seat is of artificial leather, well-cushioned on four-inch springs. Protection from the weather is afforded by close fitting door curtains mounted on uprights and opening and closing with the door.

The new truck which is already on display in many Ford dealers show rooms throughout the country, sells complete with steel cab and body for \$490 F.O.B. Detroit, being priced in accordance with the standard Ford policy.

In addition to the saving offered truck users in this body, is the convenience of now being able to buy the Ford ton truck complete and ready to put into service.
