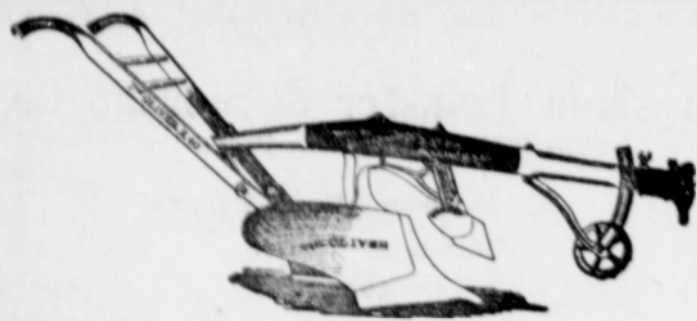

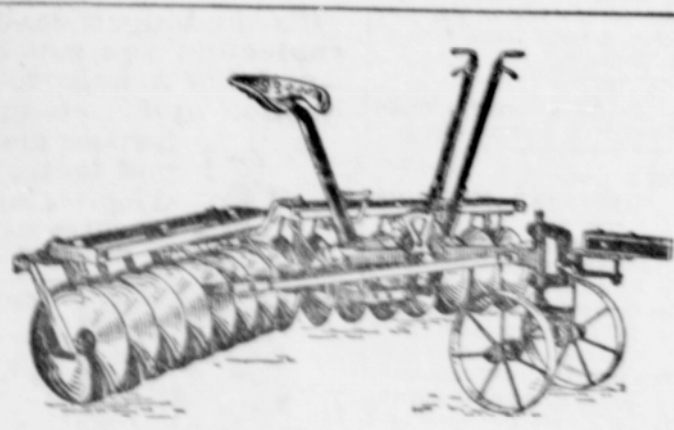

Grandma Johnson is 88 years of age. Ordinarily she is able to look after her house and is unusually sprightly, but lately has been ill. She is a pioneer of 1852 and came in the ox train with the famous Baptist missionary Joab Powell. When the long train of 500 wagons crossed the Kansas line on its westward journey, Hannah Hink, 16 years old, and her young lover, Samuel Boone Johnson, were married, she having slipped away with her sister and brother-in-law because of the refusal of her parents to allow her to marry and undertake the long and dangerous trip to the Oregon country. The ceremony was performed by Joab Powell. Mr. Johnson passed away at his home in Gresham in 1914.

These reminiscences and others were brought out in the pioneer program yesterday, when Mrs. A. J. W. Brown read selections from Pioneer Campfires by Kennedy.

Mrs. Clanahan is also a pioneer in the sense that she was born of pioneer parents 39 years ago. She has lived practically all of her life in this community.

Mrs. H. S. Clow gave an appropriate reading, "The Old Church and the New."

Potted plants were presented to Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Clanahan by the ladies. Delicious refreshments were served.
