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AROUND THE WORLD FLIGHT.

About 20 years ago the airplane was being experimented with by the Wright brothers and others. The success of a heavier than air machine was still thought dubious.

About 17 years ago an airplane was brought out from Portland, taken to the top of Gresham Butte and an attempt made to fly it, hopping off from the top toward the open fields northward. The plane was wrecked near the starting point and many Greshamites viewed the remains and got souvenirs. The names of the promoters and the results of the attempt were kept very quiet at the time.

Now four airplanes with their pilots and machines are starting on a round-the-world trip, passing over Portland this week, on their way up the Alaska coast, across to Siberia, down to Japan, along the coast of China, India, up through Europe, England, touching Iceland and Greenland and across to Canada and down to Washington and to the starting point.

The development of the airplane has depended upon and kept pace with the development of the gas engine, and lays but little behind the development of the automobile, although being more costly and dangerous it is not accepted as readily. The gasoline engine may be said to have made both.

The present flight is under the direction of our war department, or, more specifically, the United States army air service, and is the first attempt of the kind ever undertaken by any country. Again America leads.

This flight is not to be confused with the attempt to reach the north pole which will come later this year, the Shenandoah, an air ship being used.
