tions, and advertisement for paving certain sections of roads.

"Ordered that the roadmaster be authorized to prepare plans, specifications and advertisement for the paving of a stretch of road on East Stark street, between East 20th and East 24th streets; also plans, specifications and advertisement for paving a portion of Patton road from Sherwood Drive westerly to meet the city pavement; also plans, specifications and advertisement for paving that section of Powell Valley road in Gresham extending from the fountain easterly to the church on Roberts avenue; it being the understanding that it is the desire of the abutting property owners, that the county extend the paving of the said portion of Powell Valley road at Gresham to the sidewalk and that said property owners are making suitable arrangements whereby the expense of paving, with the exception of the 18 foot strip to be paved by the county, will be borne by them. Conditioned on the completion of this work by the county, the city of Gresham proposes to take over as city streets all paved county roads within the city limits of Gresham."

Recorder Schneider also read a communication from the city of Portland pertaining to water regulation.

SMELT AGAIN RUNNING IN THE SANDY RIVER

Smelt are again running in the Sandy river, according to information received from Troutdale this morning. The run is not large but is thought to be sufficient to provide a hatch for next year.

The run of the little fish into the Sandy commenced last week but the river went down Saturday and left thousands of them on the banks and those hovering outside the river could not get in. As a result the fish started up the Columbia to spawn in the sloughs along the river. Water was turned in Wednesday by the Portland Railway, Light and Power company from the reservoir at Bull Run, which raised the Sandy more than a foot and made it possible for the fish to succeed in getting into the river.

The permanent improvement of the mouth of the Sandy is a matter of much importance to residents of this vicinity and to the state fish commission and a meeting will be held in the Troutdale city hall next Tuesday evening, April 8, to discuss the matter. Members of the fish commission are expected to be present and a good turnout is expected from Troutdale and the surrounding country and from Gresham.
