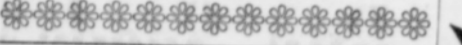
Those not attending services elsewhere are invited to hear Evangelist Dewey next Sunday.

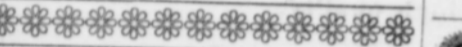
