The Women's Home and Missionary society of the Lutheran church will give a program at the church on Saturday evening, April 12. Refreshments will be served. All are cordially invited.

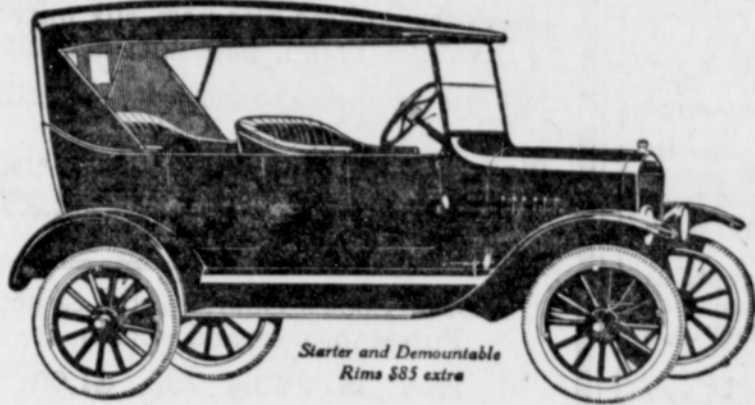
LUSTED
