Mr. Henricks comes well recommended and will put his experience and energies into the plant to make it a success. The plant was run last summer as an ice and ice cream factory and is said to be well equipped for these lines.

## W. C. T. U. Will Sell Fair Tickets 50-50

In order to help the children's farm home the W. C. T. U. of the county has arranged with the fair board to make a canvass of the county, particularly Portland, for the sale of single admission tickets to the fair, the proceeds to be split 50-50. It is predicted they will have a large sale.

The stock barns have been overhauled by removal of all partitions and opened up to give a general view of the stock. It is considered this will be a decided improvement.

Certain of the horsemen have requested the privilege of having their own barns at the race track. Arrangements were made at a special board meeting held this week to furnish material, the horsemen to pay for the labor, and thus build 17 new barns north of the grandstand. As the fair has the material mostly on hand it will mean little or no outlay of money. The horsemen will rent the barns and the rent will be credited on the labor cost, the barns to belong to the fair board.

## GEORGE CLINTON GORDY SUCCUMBS TO STROKE

George Clinton Gordy passed away at his home in Gresham Thursday evening, April 17, following a stroke of paralysis which he suffered a few days ago. He was first stricken with paralysis about two years ago and never fully recovered. He was a man of a sunny, cheerful disposition and during his long months of ill health was always careful to not allow his condition to be a burden to others.

Mr. Gordy was born near New Holland, Ohio, September 20, 1846. He spent the most of his life in Kansas and from there made three trips to Oregon. About four years ago he settled in Gresham where he has lived until the time of his death. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Vivian Gordy, their two daughters, Mrs. J. J. Wilson of Portland, and Mrs. John Houtz of Emmett, Idaho, also by two daughters of a former marriage, Mrs. Harry Wright of Cincinnati, Ohio, and Mrs. John Collopy of Turon, Kansas.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 2 o'clock from the Methodist Episcopal church, Dr. A. Thompson officiating. Interment will be in the Gresham cemetery.

## Legion Requested to Abandon Celebration

A strong request has come to the American Legion post from the management of the berry growers organization to abandon the proposed Fourth of July celebration on the ground that, coming on Friday, the celebration will interrupt the berry picking and cause loss to berry growers.

The proponents of the celebration were quite upset by this request and started an investigation to determine the attitude of the individual berry growers on the matter. A half dozen or more were interviewed and all expressed themselves as thinking the celebration would not interfere with the berry harvest and one of the largest growers in this locality said it would be a help in keeping the pickers on the job who would otherwise go elsewhere and lose more time.

The matter was presented to the executive committee of the legion last night and after careful consideration it was decided to go ahead with the plans for the Fourth. It is felt by some, however, that more should be heard from and the matter should be given further consideration.

It is felt to be a serious question. It is certain the men of the legion, who are backing the celebration, would not want to go ahead if they were convinced there was a general consent that loss to the berry industry of this locality would result.
