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PASSING OF FARMER SMITH.

The farmers of Oregon and of the great west have lost a friend and adviser in the death of "Farmer" C. L. Smith. He passed away yesterday at the home of his daughter in Portland, at the age of 79.

Farmer Smith was a real practical farmer for many years and became an adviser of the farmers throughout the length of the Union Pacific system. He traveled extensively, met the farmers personally and lectured in many communities, wrote and circulated booklets, covering all practical phases of agriculture.

His effort was not so much to impart technical information but friendly advice and inspiration. He put great emphasis on the home, on education, on economy, contentment and success.

Farmer Smith was well known in this locality, having spoken here many times. His last appearance in this vicinity was probably at a recent meeting in Troutdale in the interests of the celery and lettuce growers of eastern Multnomah.

He was a Civil War veteran, though only 16 years old at the outbreak of the war. He was in the battle of Mission Ridge where he was wounded eight times.

RECALL PETITIONS FILED.

The recall petitions against the county commissioners of Multnomah county, Messrs. Rudeen, Rankin and Walker, have, it is reported, received upwards of 30,000 names each and will be filed today. The commissioners have five days within which they may resign which would eliminate them from the recall election to be held in connection with the primaries on May 16.

According to the report none of the commissioners has any idea of resigning. Mr. Rudeen's term would expire next January 1, and he is a candidate for re-election. There are many others out for the same position, among them Rufus C. Holman, formerly for 10 years county commissioner.

There will be three candidates voted on to take the place of the recalled commissioners if the recall election carries. The successors of Rankin and Walker would serve for two years and eight months, or for the remainder of their terms.

In the meantime the investigations are going on behind closed doors. Rapid progress is being made, it is said, and the public will undoubtedly be advised of the findings before election day.

Now that the republican voters of the United States have voiced in the most positive terms their desire to have Calvin Coolidge as their candidate for the presidency, speculation has turned to the selection of the man who will run on the ticket with him.

Coolidge now has enough delegates to insure his nomination. It is doubtful if there will be 100 votes cast for any other candidates in the convention at Cleveland June 10.

Among those mentioned to run on the ticket with Coolidge are: Senator Capper, of Kansas, one of the leaders of the farm bloc and owner of numerous agricultural papers. Senator Borah, of Idaho, one of the outstanding figures in the senate, is also being seriously considered.

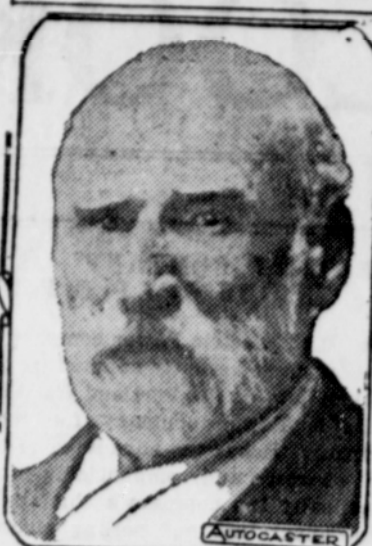

Candidates - Issues

Primary Election May 16.

John Brown has filed his candidacy to succeed himself as justice of the peace. Mr. Brown is rounding out his term as justice to which he was elected nearly six years ago. Previous to that he served about a year of the unexpired term of B. F. Rollins. Mr. Brown has endeavored at all times to exercise an impartial, unprejudiced mind in the handling of cases and has particularly endeavored to bring about the settlement of disputes out of court. His slogan is "Justice With Justice."

J. E. Calavan, a prominent educator of Portland has filed his candidacy for the nomination of county school superintendent on the republican ticket. Mr. Calavan has had years of experience in educational affairs and has gone through all of the "grades," teaching in rural as well as town schools. Has acted as school supervisor for seven years and as school superintendent of Clackamas county and has been for four years leader of the boys' and girls' club work in the State Department of Education.

Mr. Calavan, under his leadership, put over many drives during the World War successfully and always registered 100 per cent. He says that if he is nominated and elected, he will cooperate with boards of directors and teachers and with the parents and pupils to keep every public school up to a high standard of efficiency. His slogan is "The American public school; the bulwark of liberty."

Elbert W. Eastman has filed his nomination on the Republican ticket for the office of District Judge Dept. No. 1, Multnomah county. His platform reads as follows: Strict enforcement of prohibition. Will be the people's hired man. Will sprinkle justice with mercy. Will duly consider the first offender and will give special consideration to the young men and women who have broken the law. Have had 12 years' experience in the practice of law in Oregon and have had practically every kind of a case, criminal, equity and civil. I wear no man's collar; will hand out no favors and will follow the law as laid down in the books. Am 36 years of age so have passed the experimental stage, at the same time am young enough to be full of pep. I count myself a progressive. Am married and have two children.—Paid Adv.

R. A. Nielson has filed his candidacy for District Judge, Department No. 1. Mr. Nielson is a staunch republican and cast his first vote for Wm. McKinley. He is a graduate of the University of Oregon, graduating in 1913 and admitted to practice law the same year. He says that if he is nominated and elected he will endeavor to protect the public and promote respect for the law by administering all civil and criminal cases promptly and fairly. He has been a resident of Portland for 24 years.
