Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the undersigned until the hour of 3 p. m. of the 1st day of May, 1924, and immediately thereafter publicly opened by the school board of Multnomah County School District No. 25, at the City Hall in the town of Troutdale, Oregon, for an issue of bonds of said district in the sum of \$20,000.00, said bonds to be in denominations of \$500.00 each, to bear date of June 1st, 1924, and to mature serially at the rate of \$2000.00 each year beginning one year after date; said bonds to bear interest at not to exceed 5 1/2 per cent, payable semi-annually at the office of the Treasurer of Multnomah County, in the City of Portland, Oregon.

All bids to be accompanied by a certified check of 5 per cent of the par value of the bonds bid for.

Bidders will be required to furnish blank bonds free of charge to the district.

The board reserves the right to reject any or all bids.
