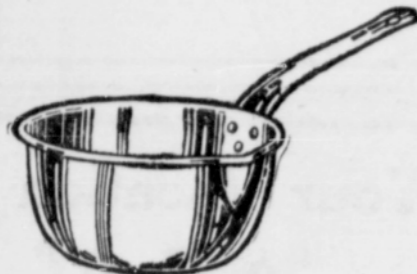

METHODIST CHURCH UPHOLDS VOLSTEAD ACT

One of the first acts of the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church which opened its 34th quadrennial meeting yesterday in Springfield, Massachusetts, was to pass resolutions assuring congress that the church is solidly back of the prohibition amendment and urging the enforcement of the Volstead act. By a unanimous vote a committee of five, including two bishops, was appointed to wait on congress.

The general conference, representative of world-wide Methodism, will hold its sessions throughout the month of May.
