## U. OF O. GIFT CAMPAIGN IS WELL ORGANIZED

Gresham alumni of the University of Oregon have begun work on their campaign to raise a large share of the million dollar alumni fund which will be used to erect new buildings.

Merwin Rankin '11, of Gresham, is local chairman of the campaign which will be completed May 30.

University of Oregon alumni all over the nation are organizing for this work which is a part of the University's \$5,000,000 Gift campaign which is to finance its five year building program. Students on the campus have raised \$219,000 to build the Student Union and the people of the city of Eugene have proposed to issue bonds to raise \$500,000 for the University's auditorium. The alumni's share will be used for a library, a men's gymnasium and a war memorial court in honor of the University of Oregon men who died in the World War.

The Gift campaign has been organized because increased enrollment has made it necessary to use most of the University's income for instruction, leaving small margin for buildings. The University is determined not to "wholesale" education and to keep its standards high despite increasing numbers. And it looks to its alumni throughout the country and the friends of higher education in Oregon to supply the funds to care for its immediate building needs. This is not a new departure for state universities; many of them have found it impossible to adequately finance rapidly growing work from state appropriations alone. State universities have received over fifty million dollars in private gifts, the University of California alone receiving over \$13,000,000.

## U. OF O. CAMPAIGN STARTS MAY 9

The campaign inaugurated in behalf of the University of Oregon to obtain \$5,000,000 in five years through gifts has reached the active stage of its progress. On May 9 there will be inaugurated by the University alumni, who have taken upon themselves the task of raising \$1,000,000 of the scheduled \$5,000,000 as their share, a three weeks' intensive drive. Former students of the University everywhere, the world over, are to participate.

Necessity is the spur which is driving the University of Oregon gift campaign. Attendance at the University is increasing so fast that it is outgrowing the facilities. Attendance within the past four years has increased 39 per cent. During the same period the University's income from the state has increased but 5 per cent. All of the University's buildings are crowded. Some of them are over-crowded. Not only is the attendance growing, but the rate of increase is growing, but the rate of increase in the attendance is growing. These facts and the further one that the University prefers not to ask appropriations from the over-taxed public for increased facilities, furnish the reasons for the gift campaign.

This campaign was inaugurated a year ago, but it has only recently become fully organized and begun to attain real headway. The first big effort of the campaign is that to be made by the alumni from May 9 to May 30. With the \$1,000,000 which the alumni propose to raise it is intended to provide a new library, a gymnasium and a splendid memorial court. Citizens of Eugene in a mass meeting held recently have pledged themselves to provide \$500,000 for a splendid auditorium to be built on the University campus, big enough to accommodate from 5,000 to 6,000 students. At present it is not possible to hold an assembly of all students indoors, because there is no building at the University which will accommodate the 2,400 students now in attendance. The current student body has pledged as its contribution to the gift campaign the funds necessary to supply a building for the Students' Union.

The alumni of the University are taking the lead in the campaign. After they have completed their share of the work and the fund, a similar drive to theirs is to be made among the citizens of Oregon generally. Through the alumni drive it is expected that the scope and purpose of the plan will become familiar to the public generally, so that the progress of the state-wide campaign to come later will be facilitated. Efforts also are being made to enlist the contributions of persons of means everywhere who have special reasons for interest in the University of Oregon.

The "kick-off" of the alumni drive campaign on May 9 is to take the form of drive dinners. Wherever there is a group organized for the campaign, in Oregon and out, that group will get together at table on the evening of May 9 and launch the drive.

## Pointer on Washing the Car.

In washing a car, use plenty of water, but not at high pressure. Much force to the stream will drive gruff into the varnish; it will also drive water into cracks and joints, where it will do damage. Wooden parts will not hold together well if water is constantly forced into the joints. Let the hard mud spots have time to soften by soaking. Do not rub them off, if at all possible, but should it be necessary, do it gently. Grease spots should be removed with a soapy cloth. Avoid lye soap, as it will deaden the varnish. The result of the wash will depend much upon the final wiping given the car. Never use hot water.—Automobile Digest.

## CURTIS C. HENDRICKS TAKES NEW POSITION

Curtis C. Hendricks, who has been for some time managing editor of the Whipple Echo, organ of the disabled veterans at Whipple, Arizona, has resigned his position and has gone to Johnson City, Tennessee, via Phoenix and New Orleans, to take the position of editor of the American Phalanx, a veterans' publication, according to a news item in the current number of the Echo.

The work of Hendricks in connection with veterans' affairs was highly commended by the patients' committee, which made the following statement:  
In losing the services of Mr. Hendricks the patients' committee feels that it is losing the services of a man who has been an outstanding figure in the disabled man's fight for justice and equity, a man with the courage and intellect to be a leader in the fight, one with strong convictions and the strength to back them up regardless of opposition. It is consoling to know that, though no longer connected with the Echo, he will nevertheless still continue in touch with veterans' affairs through his connection with the American Phalanx, of which publication he will assume the position of editor. The patients' committee further wishes to state that it heartily endorses and approves the policy of Mr. Hendricks in his editorship of the Whipple Echo, and realizes and acknowledges its indebtedness to him for his untiring efforts in this connection. That the utmost success will attend him in his new venture is not only our urgent wish, but our unqualified belief.
