**CHOCOLATE DOUGHNUTS**

- 2 tablespoons Amaizo
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 oz. (2 squares) melted chocolate or 6 tablespoons cocoa
- 1 cup milk
- 3 cups flour
- 3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
