SUNDAY SCHOOL BOYS MAKE TRIP TO SALEM

A boat in the locks provided enough excitement to last while the first flat tire was changed.

The party had lunch at the state fair grounds about 10 o'clock. On the way down a detour was made in order that the boys might see the Indian school at Chemawa. The absence of paint and feathers made some of the younger boys doubtful as to whether they were really Indians but they were finally convinced that perhaps they were, even if they looked like a bunch of ordinary school children.

At the state school for the blind the work of the children was of great interest and the boys were much impressed with the fact that blind children can do many things which they themselves can not. The manual work was especially interesting as some of the students were working with tools of various kinds. Piano tuning, broom making, chair caning, and basketry, as well as rug weaving and hammock making were among the activities shown. The boys all inspected the books that the blind read and saw a girl transposing music into the same system on a machine that made dots instead of letters and looked like a small type writer. One of the teachers was reading for her.

At the capitol building the visit to the governor was made and the boys all made the climb to the dome. They visited the campus of Willamette University where they met Miss Anna Lennartz, who was a former teacher of the younger boys' class.

The State Training school was visited and the boys were surprised at the type of boys they found there. Superintendent Gilbert personally conducted them over the building and grounds. The shoe shop and the kitchen seemed to attract more attention than any thing, unless it was the ball game going on in the court. Very friendly relations seem to exist between Mr. Gilbert and the boys. He was met with frankness and many of the boys smiled when he passed them in their games.

The State Hospital for the insane was visited. It was a very special privilege granted the boys to visit this institution on Saturday, as it is not a visiting day. The immense building was of special interest and all were fascinated with the underground railway that connects all parts of the building. This underground passage is a wonderful saver of time. The sewing room, where all the garments for the 1800 patients are made, the kitchen, with its immense ranges, where all the food is prepared, the laundry, the sawdust conveyor which feeds the heating plant, the boilers, the bakery where 800 to 900 3-pound loaves of bread are made each day, were among the many things that the boys will not soon forget. They also visited several wards of patients.

A noisy, happy trip home completed the day about 8 o'clock and at least 22 people in this part of the country were known to sleep soundly that night. Mr. Flemming, who had trouble with his car, was left at Hubbard for repairs and came home early the next morning.

It was an eventful day full of interest to all and a little demonstration of applied Christianity. FORD, SICK, MAKES SHOOTING RECORD

The state shoot recently held at Pendleton was one of the best ever held, according to O. N. Ford, manager of the local Portland Gun club ground, and what he believes will stand for many years as a world's record was made.

To W. G. Warren, of Portland, formerly of Los Angeles, belongs this distinction. He broke 345 out of 350 in the Oregon all-around championship. His score was 199 out of 200 in the singles, 47 out of 50 in the doubles, and 99 out of 100 in the handicap, shooting at 23 yards.

The Oregon state championship was won by J. W. Seavey of Portland, making 198 out of 200. O. N. Ford, Frank Troeh and J. B. Looney each broke 197.

In the double championships Frank Troeh won, breaking 47 out of 50. The handicap championship was won by Guy Matlock at 19 yards, breaking 97 out of 100.

The high average was won by Frank Troeh, his score being 346 out of 350. O. N. Ford was second with 345.

Soon after arriving for the shoot O. N. Ford was taken sick and was under the doctor's care all the time. He was carried onto the grounds on a cot. It was not thought he could participate, but he nerved himself for the effort and made a remarkable record.
