

WORKMAN ELECTROCUTED AT BULL RUN SATURDAY

John Hackler, aged 38, an employe of the Portland water bureau, was instantly killed by electrocution last Saturday at Bull Run, where he was employed with other workmen discharging a blast. The wire leading from the battery box to the powder charge was blown across one of the 6600-volt wires leading to the city of Portland. Hackler had been warned by the other men, but said the wire was insulated. A pulmotor was brought from the power plant but the man's life was extinct. He has nieces in Vancouver and Portland and a brother in Wapinitia.

BERRY CARRIERS SIZE CHANGED FOR GROWERS

A change has been ordered in the size of the berry carrier to be used in picking raspberries and arrangements have been made by the management of the Berry Growers Packing company to furnish the material for the carriers at a less price than could be obtained by separate individuals. In a letter to the grower members Manager D. E. Towle explains the change and makes other seasonable suggestions. His letter is as follows:

Please take notice that the specifications given for carriers were not correct as the hallocks we have decided to use since giving the notice on the 28th are 5 1/4 by 5 1/4 inches, hence the change. We have made inquiry and will have a supply of the material for these carriers already cut from the factory in the near future that will be cheaper than you can supply, so we will not furnish new specifications.

Have you received your fresh fruit sales permit? If not please call for it. We have reason to believe the strawberry tonnage will fall short of our estimates and in order to protect our barreled berry orders, we must ask all those who are selling in the fresh fruit market to cut down their sales and deliver more to the cannery, to apply on the barreled orders.

There is a market for the cull strawberries. By culls we mean very small berries under half inch across, also deformed berries and bird-pecked. These culls cannot be handled in small lots so we will recommend that all growers should pick culls one day each week during the season, preferably so as to deliver on Monday. Use cannery crates and keep the berries in a dry cool shade to prevent mold and decay. Be sure to make delivery by Monday noon of each week, and if you all follow this plan we can handle these culls for you.

While in Puyallup recently the writer visited the experiment station and received a number of bulletins that carry much of interest and value to berry growers and we will ask the Outlook to print same for your benefit. One is entitled "Fall Work in the Berry Field" by Harry Locklin, horticulturist, and the other, "Diseases and Insect Pests," by Arthur Frank, plant pathologist.
