OREGON CAVES BOOKLET GIVES INFORMATION

Copies of a booklet dealing with the Oregon Caves in southern Oregon have just been received at the District Forester's office in Portland.

This is the first publication issued by the government on "the Marble Halls of Josephine County" for which there has long been a need, especially since this attraction was opened up by the completion in 1922 of the Forest Service road to these caverns. The booklet is an attractive one containing 16 pages, two maps and 17 illustrations. It is the first complete and authoritative publication ever issued on this great scenic attraction from any source. The Oregon Caves are coming to be one of the leading tourist attractions of the state.

The circular contains information on the history of the Oregon Caves National Monument, geology and formation of the Caves, the accommodations to be found there, how to reach the caves, the special features to be seen, rules governing visitors, a complete bibliography.

Copies of this booklet may be obtained at the caves, from "the Cave-men" and the forest supervisor at Grants Pass, or from the district forester at Portland.

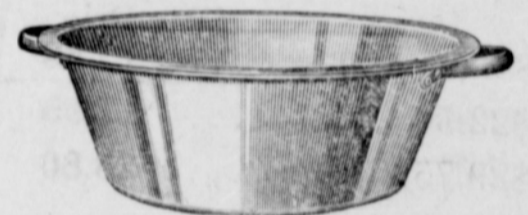
