Mr. Mulkey is out in the interest of the oleo bill and proved a very interesting and convincing speaker. Mrs. A. L. Heacock, reporting the meeting, said, "Were any of us in doubt or indifferent to the merits of the bill we were surely persuaded to rally to its support. He told of experiments, illustrating with pictures, which proved conclusively the value of butterfat in the diet and the impossibility of vegetable oils being an adequate substitute for a dietetic point of view. The increasing use of these substitutes is alarming, he states, and surely a menace to our dairy industry. He touched briefly on the filthy and unsanitary conditions under which the okra and oils are handled before reaching the United States and surely we want none of their butter substitutes made from such filth."

"Advisability of having a Harvest Festival and having an exhibit at the Canby fair was discussed and the chairman was asked to appoint a committee.

Employment vs. Politics. With the tax bill and the bonus measure disposed of by congress for the time being, it is quite probable that the tariff will be dragged in as an issue for the next congress. It is going to be difficult to play partisan politics with this issue as the public realizes that a reasonable tariff to protect American workmen and industries from ruinous competition is a matter of good business regardless of party affiliations. Many of our industries depend for their existence on a tariff which will give them an even break in the home market with foreign goods produced with cheap labor. Beet sugar is a typical illustration. We could get along without this industry and buy our sugar from foreign countries but the price we would ultimately pay would be far greater than the small amount added by the tariff which enables this industry to live and save the United States from being dependent wholly upon foreign supplies.
