P. E. P. COMPANY PUTS GRESHAM ON MAP

The Portland Electric Power company has succeeded in securing through transcontinental freight rates for Gresham and all other points on its lines, according to information gained through the traffic department of the big public service company.

This applies to carload and less than carload shipments both going and coming.

These rates are not yet in effect but the Pacific coast tariff bureau, composed of all the steam lines entering Portland, has authorized its representative in Chicago to publish the tariffs making the rates effective at an early date.

This means much for Gresham as it does away with all transfer charges in Portland and gives factories here the same shipping advantages as those in Portland. There is much shipping of machines and products from here to eastern points. It is said the bother and expense of transfer charges has worked a hardship in the past which the new arrangement will obviate.

The community owes much to the electric company which has succeeded in bringing this about.
