EMERGENCY ORDER WILL LIMIT LAWN SPRINKLING

Elsewhere in today's issue will be found the emergency order of the mayor of Gresham, backed by the Portland water board, limiting the hours when water may be used for the sprinkling of lawns. The new order prohibits the sprinkling of lawns excepting between the hours of 9 p. m. and 5 a. m.

This action was taken by the Portland water board when it was found that on last Monday there were districts in the city where no water was available for domestic purposes during the peak-load period. The purpose of the action is to insure sufficient water to various districts of the city to use in case of an emergency. If rain falls the emergency order will be rescinded, according to the board, but as long as the present dry spell continues the rule will be enforced.

Since Gresham's water supply is through the Portland water board, the order is effective here and in all districts supplied by Bull Run water, as well as in the city.

Multnomah County Wins Seal Sale Contest Cup.

A cross country contest between the counties in which Portland, Maine, and Portland, Oregon, are located, to see which could sell the most Christmas seals, resulted in a signal victory for Multnomah county. The race called forth considerable publicity during the sale in December, and enthusiasm ran high on both sides of the continent. For some time the issue appeared in doubt, and nothing was heard from Maine for a long time. Multnomah's per capita sale had climbed from six plus, where it stood at the last checking, up past seven and eight to 9.3 seals per person in the county. Cumberland county reports between 6 and 7, so the west wins the silver cup offered to the winner of the contest.

The World's Best Cooks.

"American women are the best cooks in the world and American men are the best-fed mortals," says Miss Ada B. Swann, chairman of the Home Economics Bureau of the American Gas association. "All this talk about getting the American family out of the restaurants and cabarets and back to the dinner table is exaggerated. Never before has there been such an interest manifested by women in cooking, serving and home-making. Recipes are being turned out by the thousands and cook books by the hundreds, yet the supply cannot keep up with the demand. And modern kitchen equipment is selling at a rate unprecedented in the country's history.

"There is nothing unusual in this. Any one who reads the American woman aright knows that she loves home and family first. She might have wavered a bit in those uncertain days following the war when millions of women became wage-earners instead of home-makers, but the trend is the other way now. For the present-day home-eating and home-making habits of the American people, we have our modern public utility companies to thank. These companies have taken the drudgery out of cooking and housekeeping by placing at the right hand of untold millions of American women countless burden-bearing services, all at a cost so low that when they are compared with the other items in the household budget they prove to be among the least expensive."

Stop—Look—Listen!

Why try to beat the train? You may do it but you take a long chance. The sign, "Stop—Look—Listen," has become so familiar that many drivers pay very little attention to it and the casualties pile up as a result. The Interstate Commerce Commission recently compiled reports of crossing casualties from 1915 to 1921, inclusive, showing that in 1915, 1,056 persons were killed in the United States from this cause, and 2,981 injured; in 1916, 1,652 were killed and 3,859 injured; 1917, 1,777 were killed and 4,356 injured; 1918, 1,653 were killed and 4,182 injured; 1919, 1,677 were killed and 4,400 injured; 1920, 1,790 were killed and 5,077 injured; in 1921, 1,702 were killed and 4,818 injured, a total of 11,338 killed and 29,673 injured, some of whom were maimed for life. These figures ought to be a lesson and a very effective warning—Exchange.

Tax on Messages Is Repealed.

The tax imposed on messages and leased wires by the revenue acts of 1918 and 1921 has been repealed, effective at midnight on July 2, 1924, according to information received by K. A. Miller, president of the Multnomah and Clackamas Mutual Telephone company from officials of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company. Commencing with the business of July 3, federal tax is not to be assessed or collected on telephone and telegraph messages. If completed before midnight of July 2 the tax will be collected.
