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EFFICACY OF PRAYER.

Our point of view may be wrong but it looks to us like a reflection on the efficacy of prayer to have the present democratic convention each day opened with an invocation. Perhaps, however, it is a case of how much worse it might have been without the prayers.

SYMPATHY WITH THE PRESIDENT

We expect the aged and infirm and deceased to die and our attitude of mind eases the shock of their passing. But when a youth of 16 years, in the pink of health, bright, active and promising, succumbs from an apparently trivial cause it gives all who know the circumstances, both young and old, a distinct shock. And when as in the present case it is the son of the president the whole country is thrown into mourning and grieves with the distinguished parents.

Calvin Coolidge Jr., was not a robust lad but was not of a kind at his age who would be expected to become an easy victim to septic poisoning. According to the report his play caused a water blister on his foot. It broke prematurely, poisoning developed and in spite of the most expert medical and hospital attention and most scientific methods and appliances known the young man died Monday night after a heroic battle of five days.

Under the circumstances the death is one of the mysteries of divine providence which man cannot fathom.

It is the first great sorrow of the president's family and all hearts, especially of parents, are deeply touched with sympathy for the sorrowing family.

SORROWING HEARTS.

It doesn't relieve the sorrow of a found parent to know that another parent has lost a boy or a girl, although it may help a sorrowing one to know that others are in a position to understand and sympathize. Naturally when we need sympathy we look to those who have passed through experiences similar to our own. Also, although our own hearts are torn, it comforts us to be able to say to another, "I know how you feel."

The accidental deaths of three children, two boys and a girl, each 14 years of age, bright, active and hopeful, has within the past two weeks brought sorrow to three homes in Gresham and vicinity.

The loss is not only felt in the homes of the victims, but the loss will be felt in the schools and in the community where each lived and took part in its affairs. The state and the nation suffers a distinct loss when death snatches away a prospective citizen.

Though many are spared the particular sorrow these parents feel yet all feel saddened and suffer in sympathy with the bereaved families.

Railroad Gladdens Heart of Little Girl.

The heart of little Mary Griffith, 11-year-old daughter of a railroad section foreman at Bloomington, California, is filled with happiness. The cause of the little girl's joy is a mother cat and five fluffy kittens just presented to her by the Southern Pacific company.

Recently a kitten belonging to Mary was run over and killed by one of the railroad's trains. The loss of her pet brought much sorrow to the little girl so she wrote to officials of the Southern Pacific telling of her misfortune and asking for another kitty to replace her former pet.

Through J. E. Newman, claims attorney for the railroad, a search was begun to find a suitable substitute for Mary's kitten. Finally a mother cat with five little kittens was secured and delivered to Mary who is now busily engaged training the new kittens not to wander over railroad tracks.
