Mrs. Harriet Trognitz of Alpine, Oregon, is visiting with Mrs. Roy Cannon.

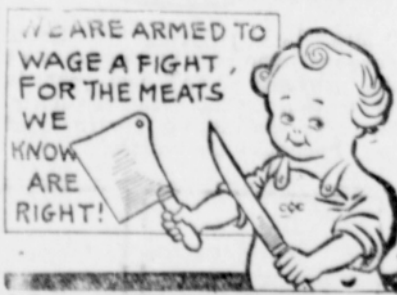
C. E. Rusher and family spent the 4th at Dodge Park with Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lansdowne, who are camping there.
