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RADIO IMPORTANT FACTOR.

It has come about so recently we can hardly estimate the influence the radio is having and will have on our civilization. It may not be too much to predict that it will mean more as a civilizing factor in the next dozen years than any other one thing.

In a few years any part of the world will know what is transpiring elsewhere on this little round planet. People will gain information and inspiration. They will become more intelligent and sympathetic.

There is probably none of the great modern inventions or discoveries which is less liable to be put to unworthy uses than the radio. On the other hand it is difficult to imagine anything more fraught with possibilities for good than the radio.

The apparatus necessary is capable of wonderful simplification and adaptability.

Poultry Industry is Immense. The poultry industry in the United States in 1923 was valued at \$1,047,000,000, according to Robert Slocum of the United States department of agriculture.

The poultry industry is greater than the value of all the cattle raised in the same period; About six times the value of all the horses and mules.

Seven times the value of all sheep. Nine-tenths as great as all the swine raised.

Twelve times as great as all the wool produced. One-third as great as all the dairy products.

\$300,000,000 greater in value than the wheat crop. Half the value of the corn crop and greater than all other cereals combined.

Three-fifths the value of the cotton crop. Five times the value of the apple crop and double that of other fruits and fruit products combined.

Seven times greater than the sugar crop. More than three times the tobacco crop. Four times the commercial truck crops.

Double farm garden crops. More than twice the value of the combined potato and sweet potato crops. Over three times the total forest products.

NO MORE SECRET CONVENTIONS.

The radio for the first time has enabled the entire country to sit in the convention. It has lifted the veil of secrecy. It has enabled the home folk to hear the arguments, the rulings of the chair, to note the attitude of delegations, to digest their trend of thought, when they have any, and to discover the fact when they have not.

Summed up the radio spells the passing of the boss, because even his operations, though kept secret in committee rooms and in delegation headquarters, become too evident on the floor of the convention. The contact between the delegate and those who sent him out as a representative spells a greater honesty in voting.

The abolition of the secret convention will do as much to free the people from political abuse as did the institution of the secret ballot. The radio seems destined to give us more honesty in politics, a consummation devoutly to be wished.
