General Dawes Is Many Sided Man.

The daily press has played up to such an extent the testimony of General Dawes before a congressional committee which attempted to investigate the exorbitant costs of war supplies, that many thought of him only as a profane and vigorous character. At that time, he was so disgusted with what he considered to be much ado about trivial matters in comparison with the war, that he used some rather emphatic language, one expression of which became attached to his name as a sobriquet, and he has since been known as "Hell and Maria" Dawes. It was an easy matter to learn that he was born at Marietta, Ohio, August 27, 1865, and was graduated from Marietta College and Cincinnati Law School. He has been a very successful banker and developer of public service corporations. He was United States Comptroller of Currency from 1897 to 1902, and the director of the Federal Reserve Bank in Chicago during the war and was the general purchasing agent of the American Expeditionary Forces. His most recent service was in the chairmanship of the Committee of Experts appointed by the Reparations Commission. As far as business ability and vigorous action are concerned, there has been no question about General Dawes, but the more essential consideration is that of his personal character and ideals. A study of his writings, four volumes of which were found in the Congressional library, has proved most assuring in this respect. Although an able soldier, he deprecates war and its awful horrors. In the diary he kept during his service in France, the man's heart is revealed as tender, sympathetic and reverent. In 1912, General Dawes' son, Rufus Fearing Dawes, aged 21, drowned while at Lake Geneva attending a Y. M. C. A. Summer camp. In his memory, the father built a large hotel for the benefit of deserving men who are in need of good surroundings, but without means. In his first year, lodgings were furnished for 179,000, and 59,000 meals were served. Later he built a similar institution in Boston, and also a memorial to his mother—the Mary Dawes Hotel, in Chicago, for women. The son was an unusually strong Christian and conducted a Bible class of boys at the Bethesda Mission in Chicago. The father in a printed tribute to his son, lays greatest emphasis upon his boy's Christian character.—H. E. Woolever in National Methodist Press.

162D INFANTRY REUNION AT CLACKAMAS RANGE

Veterans of the 162d Infantry Regiment which served in the World War from Oregon will hold their annual reunion and get-together meeting at the State Rifle Range at Clackamas, Oregon, Sunday, August 10, according to an announcement made by Major Fred M. West, president of the veteran's organization following a conference with the executive committee. The reunion will be an all day picnic for the veterans, their families and friends. All are supposed to bring basket lunches, hot coffee will be served free on the grounds. Entertainment features will be foot races for everyone from the kiddies up to their corpulent dads. Mother will come in for her share of the fun for there will be foot races for her and also a nail driving contest. Another feature will be a baseball game between teams selected from among those present. An imposing array of prizes has been assembled by the committee and if everyone does not get a prize it will be only because he or she does not enter into some one of the competitions. The crack band of the present 162d Infantry Regiment will give a concert and an orchestra from the same organization will furnish music for the dance which will commence at 4:30 in the afternoon and continue until 8 in the evening. The reunions of the regiment are annual affairs, the date being always set in close proximity to the anniversary of the date on which the Oregon regiment was formally taken into federal service for the great war, the exact date being August 5, 1917. SHELL COMPANY WILL AID FIRE PREVENTION

General practical cooperation of big corporations with the Forest Service Department of Agriculture in preventing forest fires was inaugurated today by the Shell company of California, which began work on repainting its 12-foot yellow-and-red dial signs, on highways all along the Pacific coast, with posters urging motorists to help prevent fires. Every Shell station has been made an auxiliary of the Forest Service, to report incipient fires immediately where it is more convenient to reach a Shell station than a forest ranger. The new dial signs, representing the work of one of the best scenic artists of the state, vividly emphasize the hazards to which the woods are liable through a variety of careless acts, and appeal to the automobilist not only to use caution himself but to spread the gospel of prevention wherever he goes. To further this end, large editions of educational matter have been prepared by the Shell company for free distribution. As the Shell company's stations and dial signs cover approaches to all forested areas of the Pacific coast, this cooperation is expected to yield valuable educational and practical results.
