SUDDEN DEATH CALLS BENEMA MATHEWS

Friends of the Benj. Mathews family were shocked to learn of the death early Monday morning of Miss Benema Mathews at the home of her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. F. Medler, 7 East 71st street, North, Portland, aged 22 years, 2 months and 8 days. While she had been ill for a few days her condition was thought not serious, although she had not been in rugged health for several months and recently had suffered with jaundice. The exact cause of her death has not been determined.

Benema had spent the greater part of her life in Gresham where she received her entire schooling, graduating from the high school four years ago. Since then she has been employed at stenographic work in eastern Oregon and in Portland and has worked for the O. R. & N. for the past two years. She was absent from the office of the company on sick leave when she died. She leaves to mourn her untimely death her father, Benj. Funeral services will be held on Wednesday afternoon, July 23, in the Methodist Episcopal church of Gresham, under the direction of J. E. Metzger. Interment will be in the Damascus cemetery.
