lunches to the members of the National guard following the big military demonstration on the fair grounds Tuesday night. It is expected to serve about 300 substantial plate lunches, probably in the grove on the grounds.

Jack Gerlund, a noted clown who has performed at fairs up and down the coast, will be on the grounds during the entire fair. His make-up is fit to kill and he has a lot of fun-making stunts.

Art Department.

The art department, in charge of Mrs. Vera L. Tucker, promises to be exceedingly attractive this year. Mrs. Tucker is working very hard to secure choice works of art and is succeeding well. Many curios and antiques are included. She says the art display will surpass that of last year. Through an oversight the amateur oil painting as a class was omitted from the premium list, and amateurs did not wish to enter in the class with professionals. The fair board has corrected this and amateurs may now enter their work in their own class. It is hoped many will exhibit.

Mrs. Tucker reports there will be a fine display of wrought metals and of wood carvings done by two Swiss experts.

There will be a special display of pictures made entirely from bits of various colored silk and cotton.

There will be a specially good collection of Indian relics by several exhibitors.

There will be a collection of antique oil paintings by a noted deceased American painter.

A good display of photographic work, both professional and amateur, is expected.

Mrs. Tucker is anxious to get a display of handmade basketry.

Children are invited to display their art work. There are prizes offered for work by children under 15 years.

Floral Display.

The floral display this year will be in the old machinery hall opposite the main pavilion, and will again be

in charge of Mrs. Frank Heiney. While many of the flowers and plants usually found in the floral display will be absent this year on account of the early date of the fair and the unusual weather conditions, but enough have been promised to make a very creditable display and Mrs. Heiney is hoping that many others will bring in their flowers. Exhibits will be entered in this department by both professional and amateur growers.

Entries in the textile and domestic science will close on July 29, the first day of the fair, at 10 o'clock, according to Mrs. A. Hevel, superintendent of the department. An error was made as to the date of the final entries in the premium list. Articles in the baking department must be in place in the department by 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning. Women are urged by Mrs. Hevel to make entries in this department. She may be reached by telephone at her home, 11x, or on the fair grounds.
