**OREGON PUPILS WIN  
CHECKS AND MEDALS**

Emmett O'Neill, a pupil of the Troutdale school, has won second prize in the national essay contest, it is announced by the Highway Education board. A silver medal and a check for ten dollars has been presented. First prize for the state was won by Artie Appleton of Astoria. This entitled him to a gold medal and a check for fifteen dollars, while his essay is entitled to represent Oregon in the final elimination for three national prizes, namely, a gold watch and a trip to Washington, first prize, and gold watches, second and third prizes.

The national safety essay contest is conducted annually by the Highway Education board among elementary school children of the nation in order to encourage the practice of habits of safety on the highways. Prizes are gifts of the National Automobile chamber of commerce. The subject of the present contest was "Highway Safety Habits I Should Learn." Another will be conducted next autumn.

To Miss Ella Deyoe, a teacher of Grant school, Salem, Oregon, go the honors of having written the best lesson from Oregon, and her paper therefore represents her state in the national competition for one of three grand prizes,—a check for \$500 and a trip to Washington, a check for \$300, or a check for \$200. The subject of her lesson was "Training Children in Habits of Safety on the Highways."

**COOPERATIVE COUNCIL  
STUDIES MANY PROBLEMS**

All county assessors are urged, through resolutions passed by a recent meeting of the Oregon Cooperative Council, to comply more strictly with the state law which provides for the biennial enumeration of the acreage of the chief agricultural crops of the state. This is urged as an important step toward the improvement of our state agricultural markets. Complete records of crop production, particularly applying to fruit and vegetable specialties with relative small national acreage, would aid greatly in the solution of Oregon marketing problems. Stated in the words of the resolution: "Successful cooperative marketing sometimes tends to defeat its own ends by stimulating production beyond the point of possible consumption."

Still other resolutions were passed by the Oregon Cooperative Council, which represents all state-wide cooperative marketing associations, and the marketing departments of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and the Oregon Agricultural College, the Oregon State Bankers association, the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, and all farmer organizations. The Cooperative council endorsed the new prune marketing plan now before the prune growers of the state. Another resolution supported the oleomargarine regulation bill passed by the last session of the legislature and referred to the people by referendum. A special resolution also was passed endorsing the Federated Fruit and Vegetable Growers, as a successful national marketing agency for local and state cooperative associations.

**Information Bureau Aids Many.**  
More than 16,000 direct mail inquiries about Oregon have been received as a result of the advertising done during the past year by the Publicity Department of the Oregon State-wide Development Fund, more than 6,000 persons have been personally served by the information bureau on the first floor of the Oregon building, Portland. This publicity campaign has included dominant newspaper and magazine advertising throughout America. One part of this campaign, chiefly through newspapers, reached 16,500,000 readers per week for seven weeks; and another part reached 13,500,000 magazine readers per month for a period of several months. This advertising, to make the most universal appeal, was directed especially to the tourist; but is also stressed land settlement, manufacturing and business opportunities. Hundreds of inquiries relating to land have been turned over to the Land Settlement Department of the Fund, which works through county land settlement committees throughout the state. At the state information bureau in Portland literature from all sections of the state has been distributed. The Publicity department of the Development Fund during the year has issued over 350,000 pieces of literature, most of which have of which have been statewide in its scope and which is available for distribution by anyone in the state who will write.

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**Prune Exchange Organizing.**  
All state agencies interested in the solution of Oregon agricultural marketing problems are concentrating toward the hasty completion of the new North Pacific Cooperative Prune Exchange now in process of organization. Among our fruit and vegetable crops, the tonnage of Oregon prunes is second only to apples. In 1923 we shipped 2072 cars of fresh and dried prunes, and it is estimated that our prune tonnage will double in the next five years.

At a recent meeting, the directors of the Oregon Growers at Salem voted not to handle the 1924 crop of dried prunes, provided the new prune exchange should be organized not later than August 1st. Also it was voted that members of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Prune association were released from contracts, and it was urged that they immediately join with some local unit that will consolidate later with the Prune Exchange. Toward speeding up the organization of local units, meetings recently have been held in Yamhill, Washington, Clackamas and Marion counties. Also numerous prune meetings have been held in Marion county, at Salem, Kleiser, Liberty, Sunnyside, and other meetings are scheduled.

**Many Settlers Brought to Oregon.**  
Over 200 families, representing not less than \$200,000 in ready funds, already have been brought to Oregon as permanent settlers, as a result of the first year of operation of the Land-Settlement Department of the Oregon State-wide Development Fund. At least 40 per cent of these families already have purchased or rented lands, and most of the others will purchase as soon as they can liquidate other interests in other places. In addition, the Land Settlement Department has on file several hundred letters from other people who state definitely that they will come to Oregon later during the summer or fall. Also, negotiations are now under way toward securing locations in Oregon for a number of colonies. One such colony, for example, represents 24 families who will come as soon as they can dispose of well improved farms which they now own.

**PAN AMERICAN ROAD ORGANIZATION FORMED**  
With a complete picture of highway transport conditions in the United States as a background for their action, delegates to the Pan-American Highway Commission are sailing for their respective countries after organizing the Pan-American Confederation for Highway Education, and formulating a tentative program for the first Pan-American Highway Congress to be held in Buenos Aires next spring.

In each of the 19 Latin American nations represented on the tour will be formed a "Federacion Nacional de Educacion Vial," a body patterned after the Highway Education Board of the United States, the parent organization. These "Federaciones" are united in the Pan-American Confederation for Highway Education. In the opinion of those participating in its organization there is thus formed an international organization destined to have a far-reaching effect upon transportation facilities of the American continent, and a foundation upon which the structure of continue friendly relations can be even more firmly established.
