Scott cemetery.

Eliza Jane Emerson was born in the northern part of Ireland, May 30, 1871. In her girlhood her mother died leaving her with the care of five younger children. In 1891 her father and his family moved to America, settling in New York. On June 26, 1901, she was married to W. K. Hamilton who, with their three children, Harry L. Allen E. and Anna, survives her. The Hamiltons came to Gresham in 1910, where they have lived ever since with the exception of two short periods when they were in Victoria, B. C., and in Portland.
