**NOTICE OF MEETING OF COUNTY BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.**

Notice is hereby given that on Monday, September 8, 1924, the Board of Equalization of Multnomah county will attend at the office of the County Assessor, at the Courthouse in Portland, and publicly examine the assessment rolls for the year 1924, and correct all errors in valuation, description or quantities of lands, lots or other property assessed by the County Assessor. And it shall be the duty of persons interested to appear at the time and place appointed. If it shall appear to such Board of Equalization that there are any lands or lots or other property assessed twice, or incorrectly assessed as to description or quantity, and in the name of a person or persons not the owner thereof, or assessed under or beyond the actual cash value thereof, said Board may make proper correction of the same. If it shall appear to such Board that any land, lots or other property assessable by the Assessor are not assessed, such Board shall assess the same at the full cash value thereof.

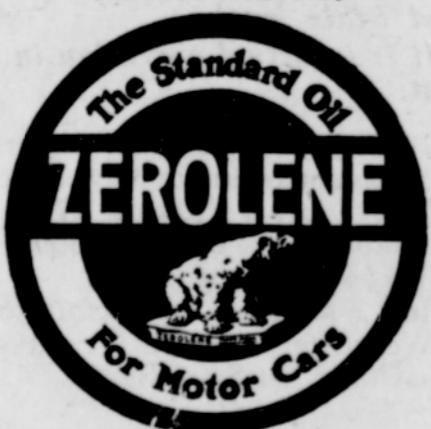
