GET THE FACTS STRAIGHT.

In both Missouri and Oregon electors will be asked to vote on the question of monopolistic state compensation insurance at coming elections.

Pamphlets, booklets, newspaper articles and other material is being spread broadcast in these two states telling the people how they are being robbed by private insurance companies.

In the voter's pamphlet which has now been distributed in Oregon, the inconsistent part of the argument for monopolistic state insurance is that private companies, by writing insurance at low rates, have caused the state fund to lose 1300 accounts, therefore, the law should be made monopolistic and exclude private companies from the field.

It would be well for the public to remember this: That an argument against monopolistic state compensation insurance is not an argument against the workmen's compensation act, nor an argument against the right and power of the state to define and specify how much, when, where and how a workman should be paid by an employer for injury received by an employe in the course of his work.

The argument against monopolistic state compensation insurance is that there is no more cause for excluding private insurance companies from writing workmen's compensation insurance in accordance with existing state laws, than there is for excluding banks from doing a banking business under existing state laws in order that the state might set up monopolistic state banking.

Workmen can secure every protection under a properly drawn state workmen's compensation law which permits an employer to carry his insurance with a private company, that they can secure under a law requiring the employer to carry his insurance with the state. This is the real point at issue and not any fight between employers and their employes or insurance companies and an injured workman.

State insurance is state socialism. If it can be established in one line of business, it can be established in another.

WORLD WIDE COMMUNICATION.

The connecting link between London and Boston for radio communication has been established and messages of goodwill with Europe have been exchanged.

Instant transmittal of messages to our neighbors across the Atlantic is one of the achievements of the Radio Corporation of America, said General Harbord, president of the corporation, in announcing the Boston service.

Establishing physical circuits, connecting continent with continent and nation with nation, will have a tremendous civilizing influence in the direction of goodwill and cooperation.

The long arm of radio connects American commercial and social life with England, France, Germany, Norway, Italy, Poland and Japan.

In a demonstration at the opening of the Boston station, six minutes and thirty-two seconds passed from the time messages were sent until the answer was received. Further, as a test of the wonderful world-searching power of radio, the operator at Boston picked up the captain of the S. S. Borengaria, 1045 miles east.

Millions of people all over the world are beginning to understand the wonderful benefits and blessings of the miracle achievement of the Twentieth century.

Health Reminders

Safeguarding the School Child.

The opening of school brings with it the problem of protecting the school child from infections, which take a jump when school re-assembles. Education has been made compulsory and although the system is not perfect, it is a conceded fact that education is a necessity. By making education compulsory we have thereby assumed the responsibility of keeping the school as free from disease as possible. It is therefore of great importance that all children be given a careful examination to determine whether or not they are disease carriers.

Successful control of contagious diseases in schools requires effective cooperation of parents, teachers and children. "To do justice to one's own child and to be decently fair to the other parent's children, it is not enough that the child go to school properly and cleanly clad," says Dr. Frederick D. Stricker of the State Board of Health. "The parents should make a definite and thorough examination before permitting him to leave the home. He should always be kept at home, at least for the day, when there is nausea, vomiting, chills, convulsion, dizziness, faintness, unusual pallor, rash of any kind, rise of temperature or suggestion of it through unusual warmth of skin, a discharge from the nose, redness or secretion from the eyes, a sore or inflamed throat, swollen glands in the neck or elsewhere, a new cough, failure to eat breakfast, a seriously disturbed night's rest, or any unexplained or indefinite change from the usual appearance or conduct. If the disturbing sign does not promptly disappear, of course the family physician should be called and only on his assurance that no disease exists or is likely to occur in the very near future, may the child be permitted to go to school or come into contact with other children.

"Many parents are offended when children are sent home for failing to comply with these reasonable requirements. However, they are even more likely to find fault if their child is exposed to disease through the medium of the school. The protection of children in school can never be greater than the parents' help to make it."
