AN INDUSTRIAL NATION.

Our country is basically industrial-minded. The American people are proud of their industries and of being a great producing commonwealth.

They are inherently self-reliant and do not easily fall into the quagmires of communism, socialism and the many seductive forms of paternalism.

The one-man blacksmithshop, the man and woman working a farm, store or restaurant spell Americanism as against government subsidy, operation, regulation, or strangulation.

That is the real objection in the mind of the average American to public ownership—it leads inevitably to dictation by political organizations of the individual and insensibly the palsying hand of paternalism appears.

AGRICULTURE YEARBOOK AVAILABLE.

The Outlook is in receipt of a copy of the yearbook of the United States department of agriculture complete for the year 1923. It is quite a voluminous book of over 1200 pages containing articles, reports and statistical tables galore, covering the wide range of subjects involved in general agriculture throughout the broad and varied farming expanse of the country.

Illustrated articles by experts on the wheat situation, sugar, the sheep industry, forage resources, utilization of land for crops, pasture and forests, farm ownership and tenancy are found in the book.

This is a valuable book for the farmer as well as the editor to have on his bookshelf and study as occasion requires.

UTILITY VERSUS VANITY.

The Open Window, edited by W. P. Strandberg, is a little sheet whose purpose is to show Oregon people their public utilities in operation. A recent issue records that a neck and neck race is on in America between Vanity and Utility with Utility only a "nose" ahead. Vanity is meant to include face powder, cosmetics and perfumery, and Utility in this case includes electric labor-saving devices used in American homes. Figures show that the value of the latter exceed by about 30,000,000 dollars the value of the former.

The vanity trifles purchased by the fair sex last year reached a total value of \$750,000,000. Perhaps housekeepers could advance utility and save on vanity by installing electric labor saving devices in their homes.

To Help Farmers

Agriculture needs help to pull up to the other industries. It needs national marketing legislation to help it get onto its feet. It needs the same degree of tariff protection that other industries receive. It needs the active help of all state commercial organizations. It must have this help or agriculture will soon slide back to the tenant conditions of Europe. As conditions are now there are two standards in our country. A nation cannot generally prosper under the double standard.

At a recent conference of the potato growers and buyers with the state market agent, this actual transaction was reported as illustrating the value of standard grades. Two barrels of potatoes were packed and shipped to the same buyer. Both were graded under the U. S. standards but in one was added a peck of smaller potatoes. The barrel having all standard potatoes brought a better price, although the other had the same quantity of No. 1 stock and a peck of small stuff added.

Five hundred million pounds of oleomargarine are sold every year in the United States. Oregon and Washington are leading the way to shut out these counterfeiters. Both states have passed laws forbidding the use of milk in these substitutes, and in both states the packing interests have held up the laws on a referendum. Every farmer and every friend of the farmer should uphold the law by voting "yes." Once let those two states make themselves fast and other states will take like action. The dairy interests of Oregon are far greater than the side-line profits of the packing concerns.

Gresham, Ore., Sept. 3, 1924. Notice is hereby given that a meeting of stockholders of the Multnomah County Fair will be held in the City Hall, Gresham, on Monday, October 6, 1924, at 8 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of amending Article 5, Section 1, of the constitution to read as follows: Section 1. The officers of this association shall consist of a board of directors, of nineteen in number, to be elected by ballot at a meeting of stockholders to be held annually the first Monday in October of each year, in the town of Gresham, at a place to be designated by the president of the board. Notice of such meeting shall be issued by the secretary, by mail, to each stockholder, at least ten (10) days previous to the date of meeting. Each share of stock shall entitle its owner to a vote, and he shall vote in person or by proxy.

Also to amend Article 8, Section 1, Article 9, Sections 1 and 3, and Article 10, Section 1, and any other articles to correspond with the above proposed amendment.

The annual meeting of stockholders for the election of 19 directors and the transaction of any other legal business is hereby called at the above place and date, provided the proposed amendment is first adopted.
