

### SUGAR OUTPUT OF ONE REFINERY IS LARGE.

A recent report states that at the C. and H. refinery at Crockett—the largest refinery of its kind in the world—2,400 tons of raw sugar are refined daily. And three days' output, put up in 100-pound bags, if placed end to end, would extend 90 miles.

This gives one an idea of how much sugar is used by consumers in 22 states west of the Mississippi river, which the C. and H. serves daily.

Recently the San Francisco Housewives' League members visited the Crockett refinery to see for themselves the tremendous amount of work which enters into sugar refining. When they left they expressed astonishment, and declared that any woman once witnessing the manufacture of sugar would henceforth realize that the price asked for cane sugar today is a reasonable one.

"This question of sugar price is interesting to me," says William B. Tyler, assistant secretary of the C. and H. "When sugar advances a few cents a hundred pounds in price due to the law of supply and demand a great roar usually goes up. Yet nothing is ever said when sugar is reduced in price many times the amount of the advance. Cane sugar is the cheapest food obtainable. You can buy a pound of sugar for 19 cents, and that pound of sugar contains 1860 calories. A ten-cent loaf of bread only contains 1200 to 1300 calories. That's a fact to consider."

Notice is hereby given that a meeting of stockholders of the Multnomah County Fair will be held in the City Hall, Gresham, on Monday, October 6, 1924, at 8 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of amending Article 5, Section 1, of the constitution to read as follows:

Section 1. The officers of this association shall consist of a board of directors, of nineteen in number, to be elected by ballot at a meeting of stockholders to be held annually the first Monday in October of each year, in the town of Gresham, at a place to be designated by the president of the board. Notice of such meeting shall be issued by the secretary, by mail, to each stockholder, at least ten (10) days previous to the date of meeting. Each share of stock shall entitle its owner to a vote, and he shall vote in person or by proxy.

Also to amend Article 8, Section 1, Article 9, Sections 1 and 3, and Article 10, Section 1, and any other articles to correspond with the above proposed amendment.

The annual meeting of stockholders for the election of 19 directors and the transaction of any other legal business is hereby called at the above place and date, provided the proposed amendment is first adopted.

The annual reports will be given. Be sure to attend this important meeting or send your proxy.
