It is likely to be some time before another park proposition is put before the people. Other things, however, may come up within a year or two.

The need of a sewer system is becoming more and more urgent and the city may be compelled to construct a reservoir to insure a reserve supply of water in case of emergency. When a vote is called for on either or both of these they will be considered not a luxury but a necessity. Corporations Take Notice.

Every corporation, whether or not engaged actively in business, is required to file a capital stock tax return annually with the collector of internal revenue.

"Ordinarily," said Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, in a statement just issued, "These returns must be filed not later than July 31, each year, but this year, on account of the enactment of the new revenue law, the Bureau will accept without penalty all returns received not later than September 30."

"Every corporation in Oregon has had blanks and instructions for more than two months, and those who have not yet attended to this important matter are urged to prepare and file their returns by September 30, after which date heavy penalties may be imposed."
