BORING

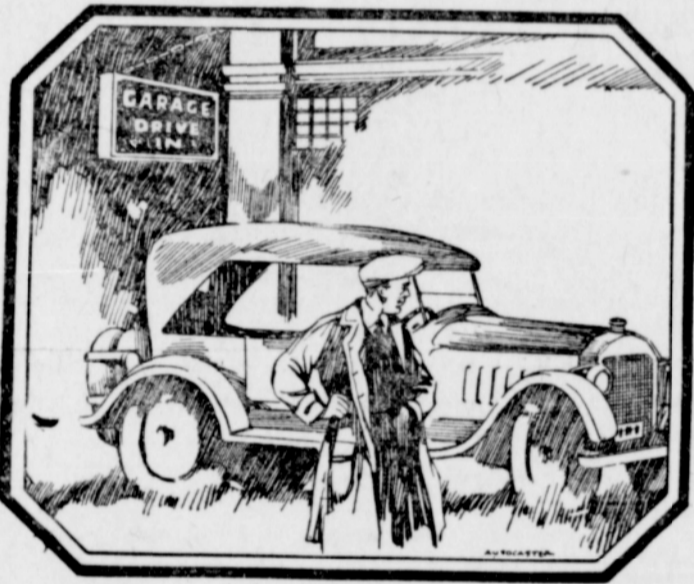
