

**Farm Reminders.**

Fruit picked while immature will more readily than when picked later in the season. Excessive loss of weight results in writing which seriously impairs the appearance of the fruit. "Wilting pears," says the Oregon Agricultural College horticulture department, "lose their gloss, are dull and unattractive and do not become aromatic."

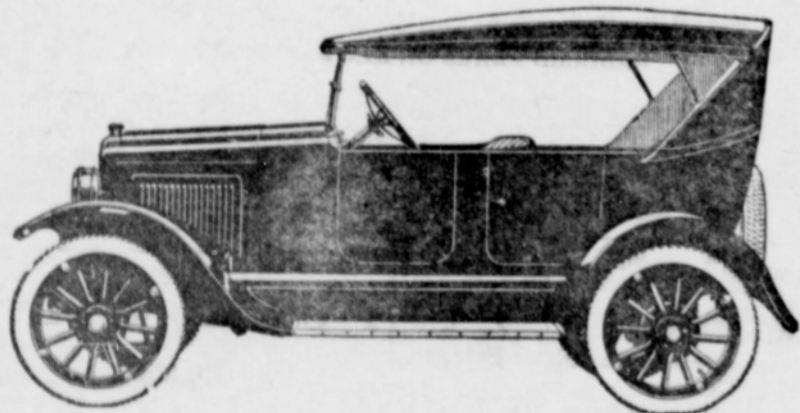

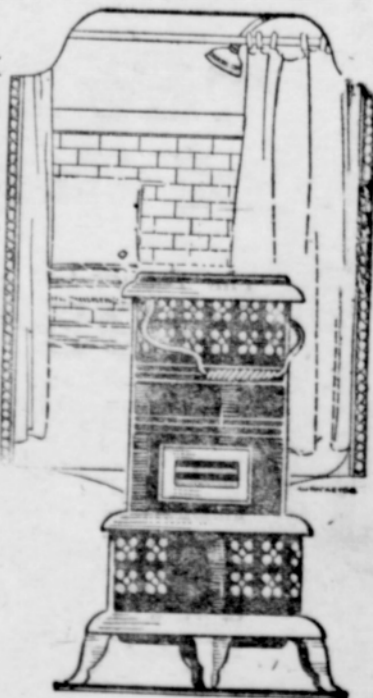
