We have examined the signed statements and exhibits upon which the foregoing tabulation is based and find that the total of \$41,252,350 is a conservative estimate of damage properly attributable to the state income tax as a determining factor in influencing decision against Oregon investment in the cases listed. We also find that many additional amounts could have been included justifiably in the total, so that, making every allowance for possible overstatements in individual items listed, the actual loss of investment attributable to the state income tax is materially in excess of \$40,000,000.

Senator George W. Joseph was born of Protestant parents in 1872 in Modoc County, California.

His parents being poor he earned his education in the common schools by herding sheep in Lake County, Oregon, and his legal education by performing clerical work in law offices.

Following his admission to the bar he became interested in politics, participating prominently in the movements resulting in the enactment of the direct primary, initiative referendum and recall.

In 1910 he was elected state senator from Multnomah County. In 1920 he was again elected to the office, serving in all in four regular and one special session. An able lawyer and a forceful and eloquent orator he was a leader in all of the sessions of the reform forces of the senate.

Foreseeing the manifold benefits to be derived in the way of tourist travel and state development through good roads, Senator Joseph was instrumental in the 1911 session in securing the passage of the law creating the state highway commission. He took a leading part in the promotion of the construction of the Mt. Hood Loop Road. Without consideration he deeded the old Barlow road to the state in order that it might be used as a part of the right of way for this scenic highway.

Believing that cheap power must be made available in abundance if Portland is to keep pace with the industrial march of the cities of the Pacific Coast, Senator Joseph favors the development of the state's water power resources by the United States government. It is his contention that the water power resources of the country belong to the people and that they should not be subject to exploitation by private interests, but that they should be developed by the government and sold to the people at cost.

During all of his political career Senator Joseph has been a champion of honest legislation and an implacable foe to graft and corruption.

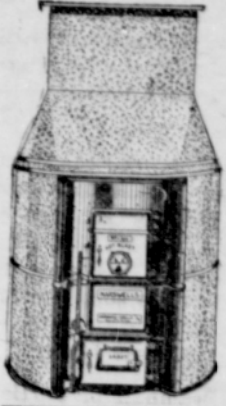

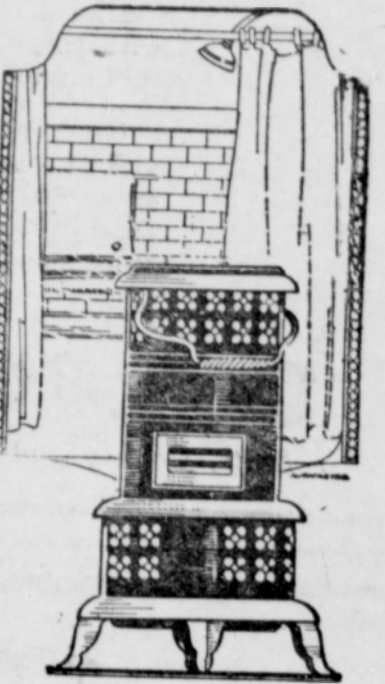
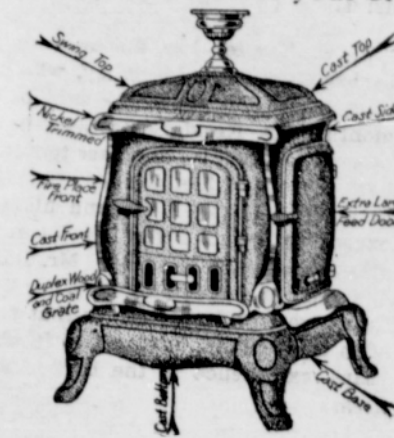
