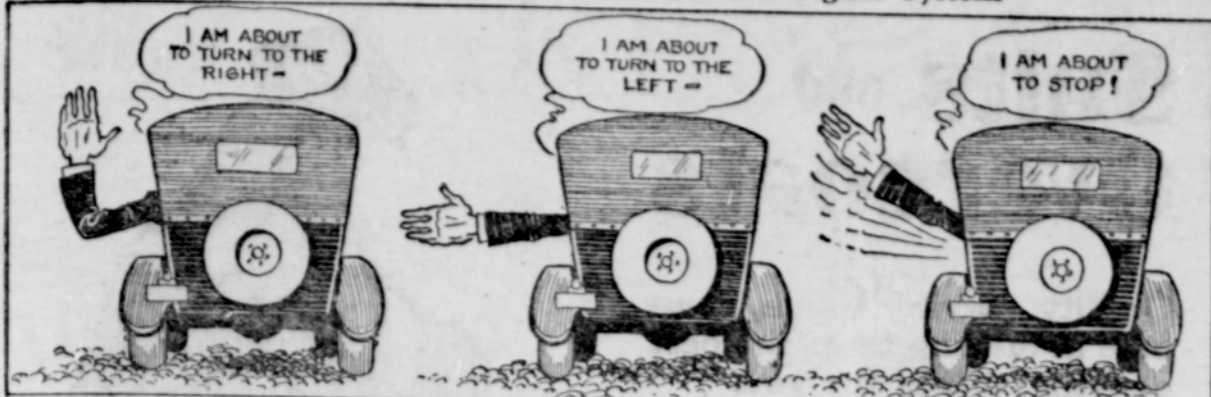
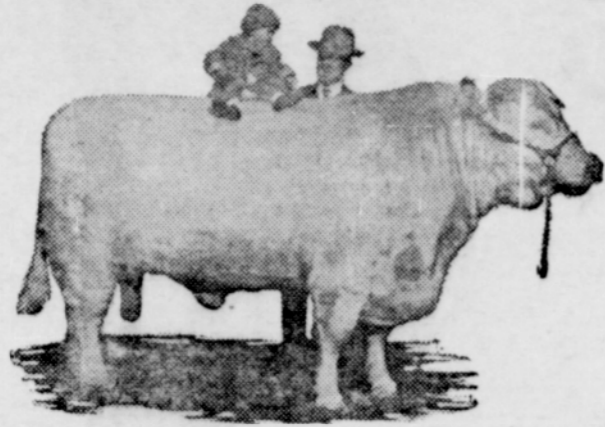


Indianapolis Recommends National Signal System

The hog show is one of great merit and excellence, and Poland Chinas, Duroc Jerseys, Chester Whites, Berkshires and Hampshire swine will come to contest for honors from many states.

In the sheep department are a bewildering display of breeds. The long, medium and fine wool breeds will all be represented.

The poultry department has been increased in size and the exhibits will be more numerous and of finer quality with a number of new breeds shown.

The Exposition is remarkable for its variety of domesticated animals shown. It is worth visiting for the sake of seeing the progress made in the production of these animals which minister to man's wants and needs.

VOTING BY MAIL.

The proportion of citizens qualified to vote on election day but who fail to perform this duty is very large, said to be nearly 50 per cent. It has been figured that the number aggregates over twenty-five million. A large number fail to vote through absence from their state and most of the remainder is chargeable to indifference.

Oregon is one of the 24 states that permit qualified voters, temporarily absent from the state on election day, to vote by mail at both primaries and general elections. The list includes Alabama, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, South Dakota, Tennessee, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

In these and some other states college men and women, away from home, if qualified, may vote by mail by complying with the conditions.

It should be a citizens' first duty to be registered and prepared to vote by mail if possible on election day. And no excuse but sickness or absolute disability should keep one who is qualified away from the polls.
