STRANGE CARAVAN TO ARRIVE THURSDAY

On September 9 a Coolidge-Dawes Lincoln caravan left Plymouth, Vermont, the Coolidge home, and started west over the Lincoln highway. This caravan will arrive in Oregon at Oregon City at 5 p. m., Thursday, this week.

It will be met by an escort from Portland and conducted to Portland where Ex-Congressman A. W. Jeffers of Nebraska, who nominated Dawes at Cleveland, and Colonel Thomas R. Hamer, state committeeman from Multnomah county will address a meeting in the Pythian Temple, West Park and Yamhill streets. The time is 8 o'clock p. m. The escort will assemble at Park street with head of line at Jefferson street, at 4 o'clock p. m. on Thursday and start for Oregon City.

"Old Oregon, Queen of the West in 1916, is going to remain in the republican column and it is our desire to make this, the last big rally of the campaign, a great success," says J. L. Day, county chairman. "Colonel Geo. Harvey, editor of the Washington Post, says that it is Coolidge—or Chaos. Let us send out the message, by our demonstration, that we are for Coolidge and against chaos; that we are for the constitution and against the Bolsheviks, Socialist, I. W. W., and non-partisan league, mixed with a few good people who are followers of LaFollette.

"Victory is our. Coolidge, McNary, Crumpacker, Kay and the rest of our republican nominees are elected, but it is our desire to make Oregon's answer to the radicals so decisive that they will take it as final."

THE CONSTITUTION A SAFEGUARD.

The fundamental difference between the LaFollette group and the two other parties is reflected in the LaFollette attack on the constitution. The radical group proposes, in effect, that the United States abandon its present form of government with balancing powers and make congress the final power in the government by giving it the right to override supreme court decisions.

Has congress gained the confidence of the people to the extent that they desire to entrust it with such power? The constitution is really the safeguard of the people's liberties against any possible legislative or executive tyranny. It affords religious freedom; the right to own property; the right to trial by jury. Excessive bail, fines and cruel punishment are prohibited. The right of suffrage is given to women.

As General Dawes says, "What kind of a government would this be if congress had the right to pass a law telling every citizen where to go to church or taking his property away and giving it to someone?" This might happen if the LaFollette plan were adopted, whereby congress, by re-enacting an offending law, could make it constitutional. — Tacoma News-Tribune.

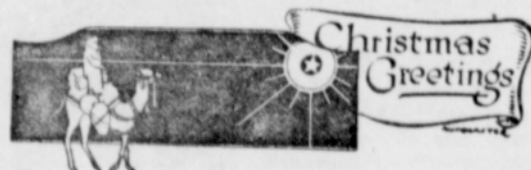
