The Sunday school of the Cottrell community church will convene Sunday morning at 10 o'clock. Preaching will be resumed in a short time.

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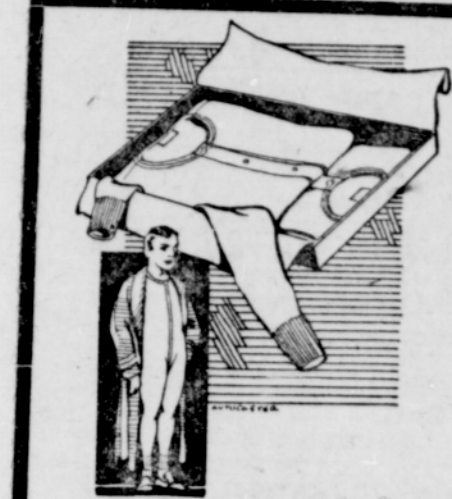
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POWELL VALLEY

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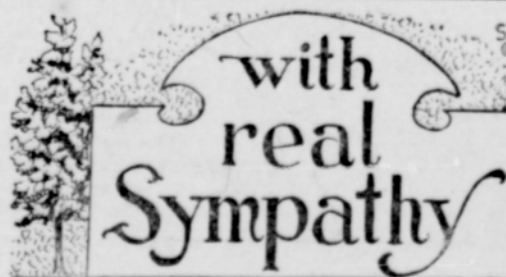
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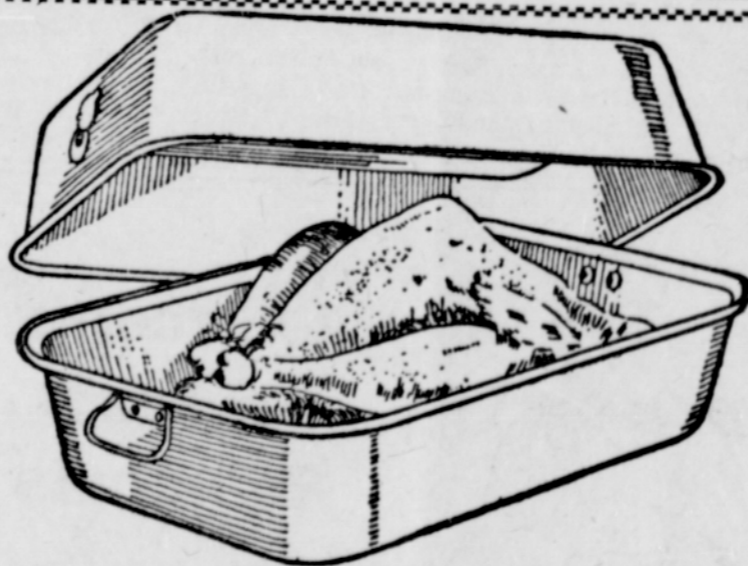
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
