## FLAX INDUSTRY MAY HELP THE FARMERS

A state or locality adapted to both growing of flax and its manufacture has a great asset, and from demonstrations of Governor Pierce at the penitentiary and experiments and investigations of the O. A. C. and the state chamber of commerce, western Oregon has both.

Flax can be grown in many localities, but the much-in-demand long-fiber product can only be successfully raised in certain localities, and in its manufacture into linen products climate is as important as is particular soil conditions for growing.

Some countries can grow the long fibre, but because of cold weather, hard water, electric and other climatic conditions the fiber cannot be manufactured where grown and has to be exported for manufacture.

The Willamette valley has both the soil and climatic conditions—it has all that is necessary for production and manufacture—and there is reason to believe that both will develop into big industries for the state.

Governor Pierce's pioneer work in the penitentiary is showing the way for the big industry and many sound business men, as well as those who have made a study of the flax industry, say that it is certain to come, and that flax growing and linen factories will make Oregon famous.

Governor Withycombe's plan was for the state to grow its own flax by prison labor, but Governor Pierce thinks a better plan is for the farmers to grow the flax and the prison to buy and manufacture it.

He has built a concrete, brick and steel factory, 70 x 200 feet, fireproof, built by prison labor, and has installed therein the necessary machinery to handle the flax straw; he has rebuilt and enlarged the abandoned retting tanks; has erected nine large sheds to store the flax straw; has developed a state water right and installed an electric power plant, at a cost of about \$10,000, that gives the prison about 240-horse power without cost, and in the coming spring he will add to the factory the machinery to make sack and seine twines.

The prices paid farmers for flax straw the past season has ranged from \$20 to \$30 per ton, depending on the quality. Flax meal is made from the seeds in the prison. Over \$100,000 worth of flaxseed, straw and fiber are on hand at the prison, and the fiber and straw will be converted into valuable products during the coming winter. There is scarcely any part of the flax product that is a loss. Flax pulling machines have already made their appearance in the valley and it is said that they will reduce the former cost of \$20 per acre to \$6.

"I have great expectations for the future of the flax industry of Oregon," said Governor Pierce. "I think we are paving the way to big future developments, and I believe that factories will locate here and that eventually flax will be the biggest single industry of Oregon and the best paying crop that the state can grow."

"We are making splendid headway with the flax industry in the prison, the penitentiary self-sustaining but will make it pay a profit to the state, besides paying a small wage scale to the prisoners."

"But we can only go so far at the prison," said the governor. "We can only use a limited amount of the crop. We are practically demonstrating what can be done, and future expansion must come from the outside."

The government, which found so many billions for the wars of other people in Europe, ought to find a few dollars for building the canals that unite the Lakes and the Mississippi valley with the Gulf and the Pacific via Panama. Another canal for ships unite the Lake country with the Atlantic. "Every big American city a seaport" should be our motto.

## More Power to American System.

The editor of The Manufacturer recently had urgent need of communication between his Salem office and San Francisco. He turned to his desk and called (not asking for a particular person). Scarcely has he replaced the receiver, when the answer came over 700 miles of wire. He asked the operator for speed and he certainly got it. A letter would have taken two days for transmission and delivery; a personal round trip would have required four days. Either would have been too late as an important news question was involved for which instant action was imperative or the value of an article of national interest would have been lost.

This is the service that private enterprise gives in lieu of leisurely, inefficient, public-ownership inefficiency. It is the reason for there being more telephones in the United States than in all the rest of the world, and many times as many phone messages per capita as in other lands. It is the reason for freight rates being less than one cent per ton mile in America, as compared with almost 3 cents per ton on state-owned railroads of New South Wales.

In the Seattle street car system we have an example of a city owned public utility and it is a failure and a white elephant on the hands of the tax payers. Yet it has been in the hands of the public for several years, long enough to try out the plan.

There are but few instances in the country where public ownership of public utilities has been successful and they were where exceptionally favorable conditions existed.

Recent attempts have been made in California to convict the state to a program of ownership and development on a large scale of the state water power and other resources. It has failed. Evidently the people believe these resources, the backbone of public utilities, can be developed more safely under private capital and control.

An unsuccessful attempt has just been made in the state of Washington to tie up the state with Seattle and Tacoma in a socialistic public ownership scheme for the control of the water power of the state. The bill known as the "Bone bill," was decisively defeated.

On the surface, the bill pretended to be a measure which would enable the cities of Seattle and Tacoma to sell electric light and power service outside of these municipalities. It also gave the right to these cities to condemn and appropriate all of the privately owned and operated public utilities in Washington. So that, in effect it was nothing more or less than a most sweeping effort to place the operation of the state's utilities in the hands of these two cities.

The voters were not only suspicious of the real purpose of the bill but they view the situation with alarm on economic grounds because it was obvious that its passage and enforcement would eventually tend to the enormous increase of taxes, a burden which would be distributed upon every taxpayer and property owner in the state, solely for the benefit of the political administration of the two cities of Seattle and Tacoma.

The defeat of the Bone bill was therefore a signal defeat for the public ownership group and a thinly-veiled move would compel all the people of Washington to shoulder a heavy increase in their already oppressive burden of taxation.

The defeat of the bill was likewise a victory for the thousands of small and thrifty investors who have put their savings into safe and profit-bearing securities of the privately owned utilities.

## MT. RAINIER TO REMAIN.

Now, Tacoma, that ought to hold you for some time. The United States geographic board for the fourth time in 34 years decides that the name Rainier shall stand as the name of the grand old mountain of Washington and that of Tacoma, long a rival name, is given the knockout.

One of the greatest football games in the entire country for this season will be played at Berkeley, California, on New Years day. It is east against west this time between the University of Pennsylvania and the University of California elevens. Both teams use much the same system of playing, and when these representative elevens meet in their inter-sectional game neither it is said will have an advantage over the other. The stadium where the game will be held will seat 72,000.

Representatives from Oregon interested in the development of cooperative marketing among agricultural producers are planning to be present at the annual meeting of the National Cooperative Council of farmers cooperative marketing associations, in Washington, D. C.

William M. Butler has been appointed by Governor Cox of Massachusetts as United States senator to fill temporarily the vacancy caused by the recent death of Senator Lodge. Mr. Butler, as chairman of the national republican committee led the party and Coolidge to success in the recent campaign.

The community chest drive is on in Portland this week. There are 54 agencies to which the six or seven thousand dollars asked for will be divided.
