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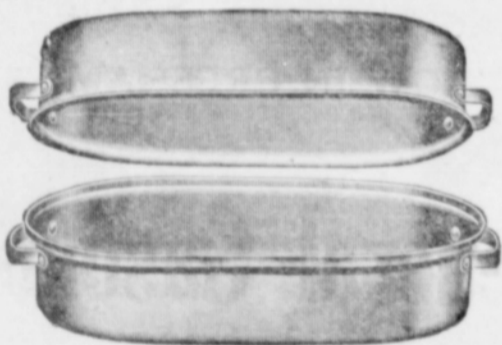

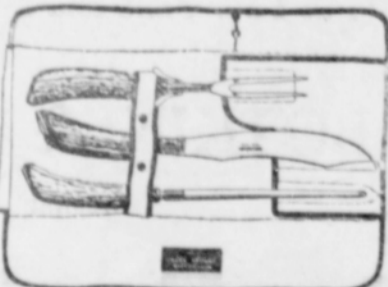

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MRS. KATE WISSLER DIES AT ROSEBURG

Mrs. Kate Wissler died in a Roseburg hospital Friday morning, November 14, following a stroke of paralysis which she suffered the previous Sunday. While attending a dinner party at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Davidson in September, at which time she was in Gresham in connection with the lawsuit which was pending at that time, she was afflicted with a paralytic stroke, but was not thought to be in a serious condition and went soon afterward to her home in Roseburg.

Mrs. Wissler, who was about 83 years old, is survived by her brother, David Weaver, who for the past year has been an inmate of the old soldiers' home at Roseburg. She came to Gresham from Omaha, Nebraska, about 26 years ago and had resided here until a year ago when she went to Roseburg with her brother. Her husband died in Omaha in 1898.

Mr. Weaver accompanied the remains to Gresham Sunday evening, where the funeral was held this morning at 10 o'clock in the Baptist church, the Rev. E. G. Judd in charge of the services. A quartet, composed of Leslie Walrad, Mrs. Ed. Aylsworth, Miss Elsie Sharp and D. M. Roberts, with Mrs. H. S. Clow at the piano, sang several selections. The pall bearers were Jake Metzger, R. W. Gibbs, T. C. Townsend, George Sletet, S. S. Thompson and Ralph Davidson. Interment was in the Gresham cemetery.

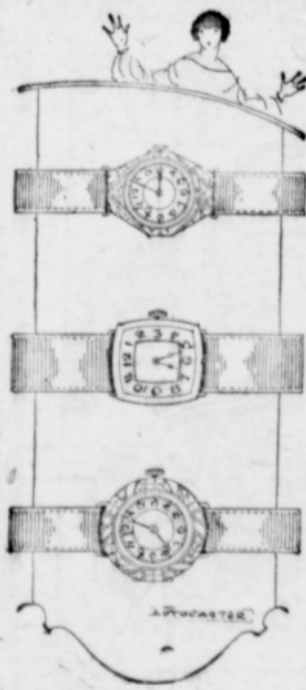

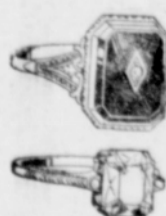
