CONGRESS MEETS.

The short session of the 68th congress met yesterday noon and disposed of a few preliminaries preparatory to the necessary legislation to follow.

According to reports not much is expected of this session. It will mark time until its automatic adjournment on March 4 next when the newly elected president will be inaugurated and a new congressional term begin.

There will be new faces in both houses. William Butler will succeed the late Senator Lodge, and there are perhaps a half dozen other changes.

The insurgent senators, including LaFollette, have been practically read out of the republican party, at least excluded from committee positions and places of influence within the control of the party.

The president's message is awaited and will probably be received today and the real work of the session will begin Thursday.

It is hoped peace and harmony will prevail and congress will do its duty for the good of the whole country.

Chief attention will be given to the annual appropriation bills.

The senate has a large amount of legislation pending on its calendar, it is said, including the deficiency bill, the Muscle Shoals projects, railroad and farm legislation. Generally speaking, farm aid is regarded as the most important of all the subjects, but since the president has appointed a commission which is engaging in a study of this whole field, it is likely that a decision as to the form this legislation is to take will await the report of that commission.

PORTLAND AND OREGON BOOSTED

A splendid industrial edition of the Portland Telegram was issued under date of Saturday, November 29. It is attractive and informative, well illustrated and done in colors. It is a fine example of modern newspaper work and as a whole a good example of the industrial progress so well portrayed in this 42-page issue.

NEW BRIDGE AT HOOD RIVER.

A new bridge spans the Columbia river between Hood River and White Salmon. It is now nearly complete, lacking only a few finishing touches, and will be dedicated next Saturday, December 6. The span is 4124 feet long and costs about \$500,000. It will fill an urgent need and do away with the slow and expensive ferry.

BURGLARS BURGLE.

From daily reports in the newspapers burglars are burglariously burgling in Portland. Not a few but a score or more are reported day after day. It is a veritable crime wave.

The police force of the city seems unable to curb the crime trend so bold and sly are the criminals.

Crime methods are about the same as twenty-five years ago but crime has increased and criminals have become more fearless and bold. In fact they have become desperate and murderous.

There is evidently something lacking in our modern police systems when so many criminals go undetected and crime runs rampant.

The majority of criminals are old hands at the game. It should be possible with all our modern methods to detect the criminally inclined before they become inveterate and prevent a career of crime.

Fortunately Gresham has not so far looked attractive to burglars, hold ups, etc. We should not let this fact, however, lead us to be careless.

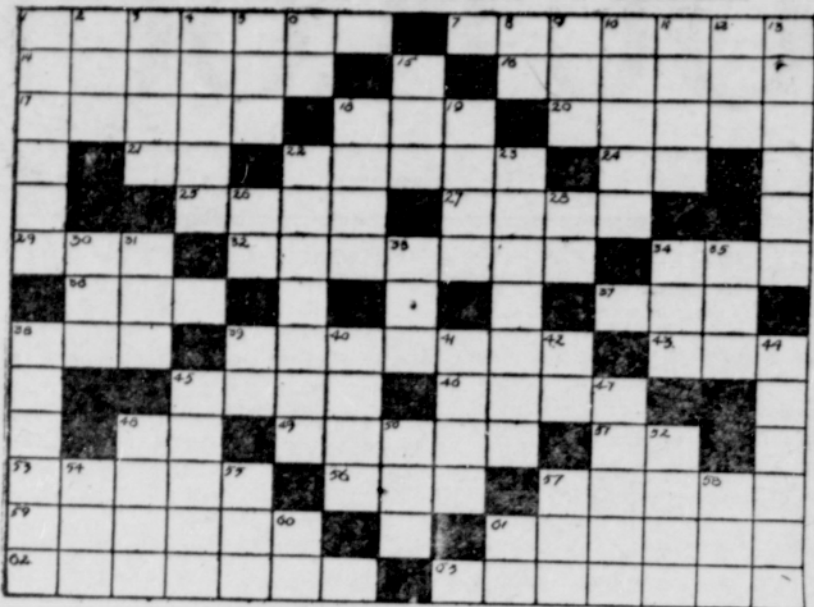
TWO TONS OF FEED FREE.

At Beaver Creek, Clackamas county, recently, says C. E. Spence, state market agent, a farmer had 140 sacks of spuds for sale. A buyer looked them over and offered what the grower considered too low a price. He said there were too many small and under-grade potatoes in the pile. The farmer refused the price offered, and then dumped and graded the stock, taking out 40 sacks of culls. He then resacked them and he received a higher price for the hundred sacks than was offered for the 140 sacks. And he had two tons of stock feed that did not cost him a dollar. This once more shows what grading will do. The consuming public demands a standard pack and the farmer might far better grade his products than to pay a heavy price for the middle man to do it for him.

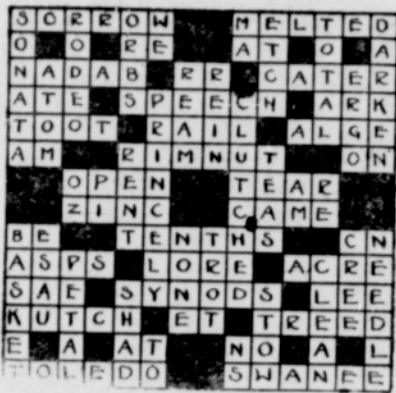
