OREGON'S INFANTRY TROPHY IN CAPITOL

The word has come from Washington, D. C., that the United States infantry trophy won in the fall by the Oregon team, of which Jackson Jones of Gresham was a member, has been placed on exhibition in Washington, it being too heavy to ship to Oregon. The story is told in the Oregon Guardsman as follows:

When the United States Infantry designed the infantry trophy it is evident that they never thought that it would be necessary to move it any great distance. Hence its design is massive and heavy in weight.

Then came the crack Oregon team, which won it from the infantry.

Followed nights of perplexity and much scratching of heads on the part of the officials in Washington, as to what disposition should be made of the trophy—certainly it was too large to ship to Oregon—and they were equally certain that it should not be left in the custody of the defeated infantry. The only apparent solution to the problem was to ask permission of the Commanding General to place the infantry trophy on exhibition in the office of the Chief, Militia Bureau, in Washington, D. C.

General White consented and the infantry trophy is now on exhibit at the Militia Bureau, and here is what the head of the National Guard in the United States says in a letter to the commanding general in Oregon concerning the custodianship of the coveted trophy:

"Major General Rickards will take great pride in acting as custodian of this trophy for the state of Oregon, if so desired, and extends to the Oregon rifle team his heartiest congratulations on winning this highly coveted trophy."

In lieu of the trophy the state will be furnished a large photograph on an engraved certificate properly inscribed with all pertinent data.

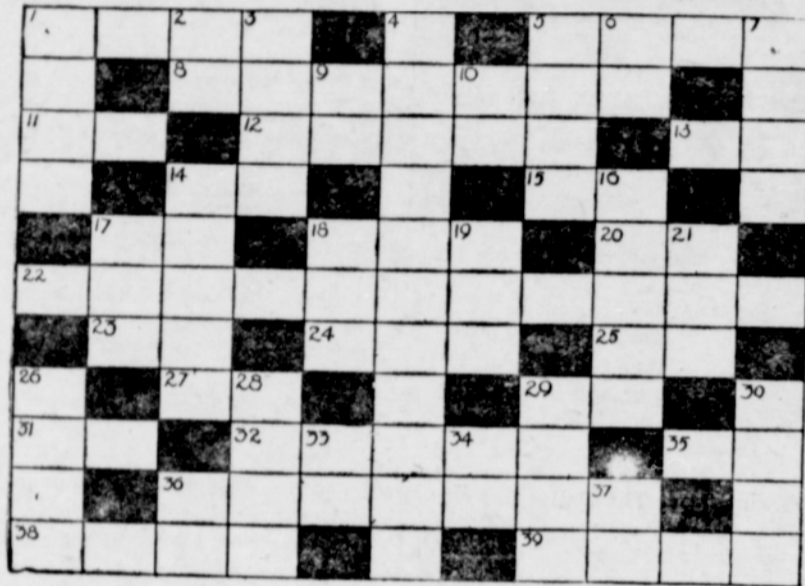

UNITED STATES LAGS IN AIRPLANE SERVICE

Shall the United States emulate European countries in building up an airplane fleet? This is a question that is agitating the minds of economists, congressmen and the president.

France is said to have 50,000 planes in actual service.

Japan has 17 factories running day and night turning out airplanes.

England has an air admiralty and a startlingly progressive national program of aeronautics.

America invented the airplane but so far the United States is far behind the other leading nations in development of its air service.

These facts have burned themselves into the mind of President Coolidge, says Edward Percy Howard, a well known writer on economic subjects. Quietly he has been digesting the growing comment of the press on this subject. Calmly and without any splash he has been analyzing the situation relative to our national defense. Now, without any dramatic message he has set out to give America her proper and sensible place in the air.

The president is disposed to believe the aeroplane is destined to supplant the battleship as our first line of defense. He is determined to know whether his judgment is correct. He has put the subject before an expert board and ordered a thorough investigation and report. While the war experts are working out their problem the president has sent to the Budget Bureau for facts and figures covering the small appropriations allotted to the various government departments for aeroplane purposes.

Want Air Secretary in Cabinet.

Peculiarly, while the president is thus pressing his inquiry, Charles F. Curry, representative from California, has introduced a bill providing for the creation of a department of aeronautics to be headed by a secretary of aeronautics who would have a place in the cabinet and direct the entire aviation plans of the government. It is not known whether this measure comes

as a result of conversations with the president or indirectly at his suggestion, or whether the provisions are the sole creation of Mr. Curry, but there is every reason to believe the president looks with favor on the move.

Unless the political dragon shows its head such a measure stands a strong chance of adoption. Certainly it will lead to a greater unification of the air service. The president seems determined no longer to permit the service to remain as the unfortunate veriform appendix of our other governmental bodies to be cut out whenever a financial pain is felt.

The naval policy of the government seems fairly well defined. The navy strength, but no more. This it is felt will be kept up to the full treaty will permit of reasonable expenditure for the development of our air service.

Whether the expansion will come, as suggested, through the more extensive use of aeroplanes by the post-office department, is not known, though some of the members of the congress who are strongly in favor of a vigorous aeronautic program believe this would be a wise way to meet the situation. They contend that a great air mail service should be established and bring to the government such income as it might be reasonable to expect. The balance of the cost could properly be charged to the cost of peace.

President Senses Value.

Here and there complaint is heard that the development in aeronautics is so electrical that as soon as one type of aeroplane is built it is obsolete. The president, however, pays no attention to such arguments. He knows that the scrapping of aeroplanes is as nothing to the cost of scrapping battleships. He senses the fact that one daredevil American with some high explosive and Yankee pluck can sink a battleship with its thousand or eighteen hundred men in the twinkling of an eye. It is safe to say that now the president has set himself to this investigation it will be pursued to its logical end, regardless of influence or politics.
