C. S. JACKSON PASSES.

The Outlook joins in the universal tribute of respect to the memory of the late publisher of the Oregon Journal who passed away at his home in Portland last Saturday evening following a lingering illness.

Mr. Jackson was born in Virginia and came to eastern Oregon in 1879 where he became identified with the East Oregonian of Pendleton. In 1902 he came to Portland and took over the Oregon Journal, which had recently been started, and which, under his direction, has become one of the leading daily newspapers of the state.

Mr. Jackson achieved notable success in his chosen field and did it by the development and use of his natural talents, by his faithfulness and friendliness and his vision of the larger possibilities of the localities and state in which he lived to the development of which he ever gave his influence and encouragement.

His motto, which he well exemplified was, "Be calm, be confident, be cheerful and do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

He was not a prominent public man but helped to mold public opinion. One of his last public acts was the gift of 88 acres, valued at \$100,000, to the Oregon school of medicine. The tract adjoins the present campus of the medical school on Marquam hill, Portland.

Phillip L. Jackson, son of the deceased, who has been active in the management of the Journal for several years, becomes the publisher.

Eleven years ago the parcels post was put into operation and it has now become one of the important features of the postal service of our government. 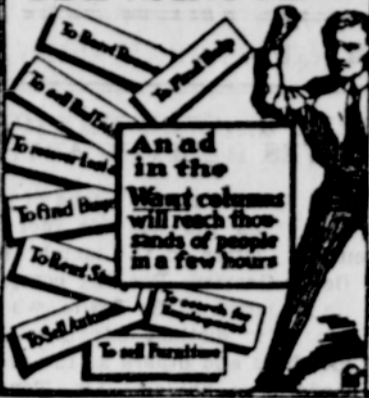

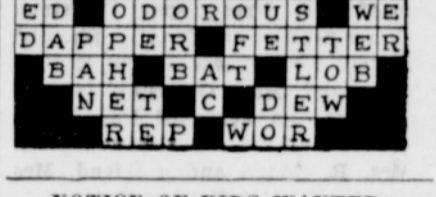
