SOLAR ECLIPSE, JANUARY 24.

On January 24 there will be an eclipse of the sun visible in this country to people living along a strip extending from northern Minnesota southeasterly to Connecticut. It will not be visible in Oregon or anywhere in the west.

Astronomers will take the opportunity to study the sun, especially the corona, or halo of light about the darkened face of the orb and will, it is said, try to gather new data to prove or refute the Einstein theory of relativity. This will be done by observing the position of certain stars in line with the earth and sun.

"THE WAYFARING MAN," BY LOCAL AUTHOR

If you haven't read "The Wayfaring Man," by George Estes, you have missed a great treat. It is one of those books you can't let go of until you have finished it and then you'll have much to think of for a long time. Its setting and characters are so unusual, its descriptions so clear, its plot so captivating, its treatment so entertaining that after you have read it you will feel like thanking the author and any one who interested you in the book.

George Estes, the author, has been a prominent lawyer on the coast for many years. He is a high up Mason, a close student and a forceful writer. He retired from practice a few years ago and has devoted his active mind and facile pen to writing. He is the author of several books and has a new one now ready for the press. Mr. Estes lives at "Cedarwood," near Troutdale.

The scene of the story in "The Wayfaring Man" is laid in Jerusalem at the time of the building of King Solomon's temple. It was a time of great activity, great wealth, great wars, great crimes, great jealousies among rulers and nations. All of the great nations of the time are involved in the sweep of the story and the descriptions and movements are based on well established facts.

The hero is a strong and beautiful character, displaying traits and ideals far above the average of his time and exemplary for all time.

There are villains a-plenty and, of course, a beautiful woman, the fairest of the fair. The outcome of the story is quite unexpected and shows the skill of the writer in keeping the reader in intense suspense, then perhaps disappointing him, yet pleasing him more than he had anticipated.

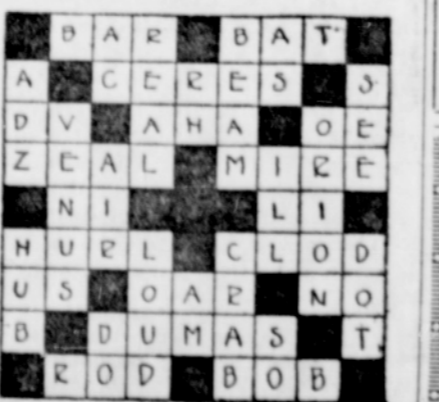
