A man giving the name of Krashman was arrested at the 12-Mile corner Friday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Squire and Mollenhour as a suspect in an attempted robbery of the Estacada State bank shortly after 1 o'clock that afternoon. He was placed in the city jail at Gresham, where it is reported he was positively identified later in the evening by Miss Minerva Dew, bookkeeper of the bank, and Miss Leila Howe, editor of the Eastern Clackamas News. However, it seems that the alibi furnished by the man had sufficient weight with the Clackamas county officials to warrant his being set at liberty after being taken to Oregon City.

A man, masked with a piece of bur-lap, entered the bank when but the women employes, Miss Ruth Dillon, cashier, and Miss Minerva Dew, bookkeeper, were in the building. He leveled a revolver at Miss Dillon, who was engaged in counting pennies, demanding her to "shove over the money." She complied by pushing a pile of pennies toward him, whereupon he demanded "the big money." The bookkeeper quietly slipped to the rear of the building and raising a window, called for help. The would-be bandit quickly left the premises and jumped into a waiting automobile, driving rapidly away in the direction of the Mt. Hood Loop highway.

Sheriff Mass and his deputy were notified at Oregon City, also a number of Estacada citizens joined in the hunt, but the arrest near Gresham was the only definite result of the search.

New Income Tax Law Proposed.
Not heedful of the substantial majority by which the people voted down the state income tax, a new bill is to be presented to the incoming legislature.

Senator Toozee of Clackamas county is to offer a bill to raise taxes by a levy on incomes in addition to the other taxes and the federal income tax system.

The bill is made up of the ruins of the one that was vetoed by the popular vote on a referendum tax, and looks like trying to reverse the popular vote.

The rate of taxation under the proposed measure would be 10 per cent of each \$1000 of taxable income for the first \$5000, 15 per cent on each \$1000 of taxable income on the second \$5000, 20 per cent on each \$1000 of taxable income for the third \$5000, 25 per cent on each \$1000 of taxable income on the fourth \$5000, 30 per cent on each \$1000 of taxable income over \$20,000.

Exemptions would be \$750 for a single person and \$1500 for a married person or head of a family, with an additional allowance of \$200 for each dependent.
